JAIL BREAK TRIED

**Tacoma Desperadoes Fail in
Their Flight for Liberty**

Seattle, Wash., June 8.—James Allison and Edgar Marshall, two of the most desperate criminals in the King county jail, sawed their way through the steel bar cells during last night, and this morning crawled out and ran down the main corridor, with razors strapped to their wrists, and dashed through the main jail office. Deputy Sheriff Hogan gave the alarm, and pursued the criminals. Marshall attacked him, but was soon overpowered. Allison slashed his way through the guards, and grabbed a prisoner named Johnson, and used him as a shield. He fought his way through the corridor, where he encountered Deputy Sheriff Bille, who felled him with a rock. Allison revived and gained his freedom again, and was running out of the front doors of the court house, when he was captured by Deputy Sheriff Downie. Allison had been sentenced to a sentence of 20 years for robbery, and Marshall is waiting trial for murder.

MARTIAL LAW RULES

**Cripple Creek Dis-
trict Goes Back
Under Military**

**The Departed Union Miners
Are Sent to Denver Un-
armed and Penniless**

Victor, Colo., June 8.—Martial law having been declared at 2 o'clock this morning, upon the arrival of Adjutant-General Bell, camp conditions have become normal. Immediately upon landing here Bell called a council of local military commanders, and ordered Col. Vandenburg, who formerly had charge of this district, to assume command. Then Bell, with a squad of troops, sheriff and the leaders of the Mine Owners' Association, started down the railway to the alleged rendezvous of the enemy on a tour of investigation.

Denver, June 8.—Twenty-four departed union miners from Cripple Creek district, arrived at midnight on the Rio Grande special, watched by nine armed guards. The miners were unarmed and penniless. The men were met by a delegation of Western Federation men, and taken to a restaurant. The miners declared that the Cripple Creek district was no longer safe for union men, and assert that when arrested they were searched by the guards and all moneys and valuables taken. The accompanying guards took the first train back to Cripple Creek.

Independence Horror Inquest.

Cripple Creek, Colo., June 8.—A conflict of authorities is threatened this afternoon, when the inquest over the bodies of the victims of the Independence depot begins. Coroner Doran, of Victor, who resigned under pressure, declared that he had recalled his resignation, because force had been used, and proposes to hold the inquest with the jury he appointed two days ago. Coroner Hall, named to succeed Doran, also selected a jury and proposes to hold an inquest. It is believed Doran will be taken out and tarred and feathered if he persists in his determination. General Bell does not deem that the situation requires the presence of more than the two companies of militia now here. The situation at non is peaceful.

Cripple Creek, Colo., June 8.—Major Naylor and a squad of cavalry left at noon for Stratton Mountain, to arrest a union miner named Fridley, who, with several companions, are barricaded in a cabin there. Fridley is charged by a number of the unionists with being the man who shot McGee. General Bell states that further deportations will occur this afternoon, and those who resist will be shot down. "We don't propose to parley from now on," Bell said. Further resignations of public officials is demanded by the committee of the Mine Owners' Association.

The man who killed McGee at the mass meeting on Monday has been positively identified, but has not yet been captured. The Record, the organ of the Western Federation, prints an editorial today urging the miners to call off the strike inaugurated 10 months ago. No further deaths are reported among those who were wounded Monday.
