WILL SUFFER HEAVY

Local Option Will Result in Great Detriment to State

The adoption of the local option law by various counties in Eastern and Southern Oregon at the election Monday will in the opinion of the wholesale liquor dealers of Portland, cause a decrease of from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000 in the annual shipping business of Portland says the Telegram and throw at least 100 men out of work. All the liquor sold in those counties, excepting a very small quantity, has always been shipped from Portland, and the enforcement of the law means the end of the business.

The export business has been principally done by the eight largest wholesale firms. They are Rothschild Bros., Henry Fleckenstein & Co., Varwig & Sons, Charles Kohn, Marx & Jorgenson, Fleckenstein & Mayer, W. J. Van Schuyver & Co. and Coblentz & Levi. Each of these firms have three or more traveling salesmen constantly on the road and seven or more men in the stores attending to liquor shipments. When the local option law is enforced the services of these men will not be needed.

The wholesale men were not inclined to speak about the law this morning. Several of them said there was "no use of crying over spilt milk," but in the end the voters would see their mistake and that the taxpayer would be the one to suffer. Some said the loss of business to Portland would amount to about \$3,000,000, and that the sum named was a low estimate. Henry Fleckenstein, of Henry Fleckenstein & Co., considered the estimate too high. He placed the annual business at \$1,500,000, and said that sum was a conservative estimate. In speaking of the law this morning Mr. Fleckenstein said:

"If the local option measure is enforced strictly, as it undoubtedly will be, the taxpayer will be the sufferer. In all the counties in which local option is carried the saloons have always obtained their supplies from Portland. Very little has been bought from other places. The closing of the saloons will mean a deficiency in the revenue, and the taxpayers will have to stand for it. It will also mean that Portland will lose a shipping business of about \$1,500,000 a year, and with the loss of this business the wholesale houses will have to dispense with the services of the men who have been attending it."

A man connected with one of the wholesale houses said that many of the prohibitionists did not favor the law. In an East Side precinct he said he saw seven ballots for the straight prohibition ticket, and each one carried a vote against the local

option law. A similar ballot is reported from Troutdale, and also from several city precincts.

SEEKS ALASKA GOLD

Charles Bruneau, One of the Original Locators of the Bohemia

Charley Bruneau, one of the best-known of Oregon and Alaska mining men, to whose ability is credited the development of some of the best mines in Oregon, is again on his way to the far north to pursue development of properties in the Kayak country. Mr. Bruneau spent last night in Portland, proceeding today to Seattle, says the Telegram.

With Jennings Brothers, Mr. Bruneau was the original locator of the Musick and Helena mines of the Bohemia district, which were finally sold to the Oregon Securities company, forming the nucleus of the extensive holdings of that corporation. Mr. Bruneau returned from Alaska last fall and spent the winter working on his Bohemia holdings, consisting of 10 or 12 claims, the sale of which has just been concluded and hereafter he expects to devote his entire attention to Alaska enterprises. The consideration received for the holdings is not made known, but it is understood approximates \$40,000.

In Alaska Mr. Bruneau has devoted his attention to the development of the extensive coal fields occurring in the Kayak region, and is also interested in several oil well properties in the same locality, and has the greatest faith in the future of the two branches of mineral industry producing from the bountiful stores of nature. The coal occurs in vast deposits, not difficult to mine, and is of a quality that makes it desirable for all heating and power purposes, while location near the coast makes it present great possibilities for export trade and as a source of supply for steamships plying northern waters. The oil developments demonstrate the existence of an extensive area of country underlaid with oil strata, the product being of naphtha base, high in gasoline and illuminating qualities, likewise capable of yielding most of the profitable by-products. Situation of the field is such as to enable private operation of refineries, regardless of the attempts of the Standard Oil company or any others to control, and it is expected that a few years hence will record Alaska as the source of supply of illuminating oil for a large portion of the world.

It will be remembered that the Musick and Mecla mines paid in dividends before their sale to the present owners, respectively, \$250,000 and \$60,000, and the men who developed the properties never lost faith in either of the two mines or the camp in which they are located. Mr. Bruneau is of the opinion that far greater opportunities for money-making are presented in Alaska than elsewhere at the present time for the persons

who have capital with which to operate.
