Russians Families Have Nothing to Live on During the War

Vienna, June 10.—Reports from Russian sources tell of great distress in the province of Kharkov, where 40,000 men have been called upon for army service, leaving their families destitute. One thousand reservists were called from one boiler factory alone, three of whom suicided rather than fight.

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NUMBER WANT PLACES

Several Candidates for President of the Senate Are Mentioned

The Salem correspondent of the Oregonian discusses future politics as follows:

Now that the membership of the Oregon legislature has been determined, the subject of organization has been broached and probable candidates for the presiding officers are being discussed.

It is known that Senator Brownell, of Clackamas county, desires to succeed himself as president of the senate, and he has not hesitated to let those interested know of his candidacy. Changes in the membership of the senate and new candidates in the field will make the contest entirely different from what it was two years ago and probably no less interesting. Senator Kuykendall, of Lane, will be a candidate for the presidency and will take much of the strength Brownell had in 1932. Kuykendall was a Brownell supporter two years ago, as also was his associate, R. A. Booth, who is now counted as a supporter of Kuykendall. It is said in political circles that Senator Mays, of Multnomah, will be a candidate, and if he gets into the race with the backing of the Multnomah delegation, the three-cornered contest will have added interest.

T. B. Kay, of Marion county, is very frequently mentioned as a candidate for the speakership of the house. He is one of the few members of the last house who were re-elected. He has been urged to become a candidate and has been assured of the united support of his own delegation, and it is very probable that he will enter the race. There has been some talk also of W. I. Vawter, of Jackson county, as a probable candidate for the speakership, but it is not known he has any ambitions in that direction.

FLAGG'S FUNNY STREAK

The Oregonian tells the following on Hon. E. H. Flagg:

An elderly citizen who has rested from his labors and is strolling about town with a cane in his hand and a bandage over one eye, while waiting at Third and Morrison streets yesterday for a chance to get across without being run over, was accosted by a slightly worn and wearied looking man, not so old as himself, who held out his hand to be shaken. Big Deal in Wool.

The largest wool purchase ever made in Yakima county, Washington, at one time, was consummated this week by Jack Lycett and Fred Alter, when they took over 250,000 pounds from the sheepmen of this valley. From Coffin Bros. they bought 200,000 pounds; Harrison & Cannon, 30,000; Stanford, 18,000; McPherson & Taylor, 40,000; a total of 288,000 pounds. The price paid was not given out, but it is said to be in the neighborhood of 12 cents. The wool will be shipped East and put on the market.
