Each number was worthy of especial praise, and showed careful training and much talent.

The Beethoven recital at the Unitarian church last evening was one of the most enjoyable musical treats of the season. The program, which consisted of the difficult compositions of Beethoven, was rendered by the members of the graduating class and other advanced pupils of the Northwest College of Music.

The class of 1904 consists of Mrs. Edwin Stone and Miss Theresa Collins, of Albany, the post-graduates, and Miss Roberta Bond, who gets her diploma in the artists' course.

The program was a splendid rendition of the works of the master, and while difficult, they were pleasing and captivating to even the untutored mind.

Mrs. Stone was heard in a beautiful number, Allegro Sonata, Op. 53, and was greeted with hearty applause. She is a most faithful and painstaking student, and has a keen understanding of the compositions.

Miss Collins rendered Adagio and Allegro Sonata, Op. 57, in accurate time, and with faultless expression, which was much enjoyed.

Miss Vera Kitchen, a little miss of 12 years played a piece that would be termed a graduating number. She is the most talented pupil of her age in Salem, and reflects great credit on her teacher.

The vocal numbers were also very good. Miss Elsie Pearline sang "I Think of Thee" in a charming manner. Miss Winans sang "Knowest the Land" and was well received. Miss Nina Johnson's rendering of "Ade-laide," which is one of the most difficult pieces of music, was in a most excellent manner. Miss Johnson has pronounced capabilities for the future and is always a favorite. Miss Pearline and Miss Winans have also a bright future before them, and have been well received by Salem audiences.

The last number of the program was "The Two Last Movements of the Sixth Symphony," and was indeed a crowning piece of the evening, and was delightfully rendered by Messdames Stone and Churchill and the Misses Collins and Dorgan. The playing of these four talented pupils is very fine, and the manner in which they rendered this difficult piece of music was a marvel and a delight to the audience.

SALEM SCHOOL ELECTION

Qualifications of Voters for Next Monday

The interest in the annual school election, which is to be held Monday, is increasing daily. The electors of school district No. 24 will vote for one director to serve five years, and will also vote to establish grades above the ninth in our public schools. The last report of the United States commissioner of education makes the startling disclosure that Salem is the only city in this country of over 10,000 population that is without a full four-years' high school course.

The qualifications for voters at the election next Monday are as follows:

1. Thirty days' residence in the district.
2. Over 21 years of age.
3. Ownership of property on which the voter is liable to pay a tax as shown by the last assessment, that is, the assessment in progress in the county at the present time.

Ladies are entitled to vote under the above qualifications. One polling place will be provided in each of the seven wards of the city.

The high school question is an important one for our city, and will no doubt receive the large majority which it deserves.

An Old-Timer in Salem.

D. Spurbuck, of Genesee, Idaho, a wide-awake town in the great Palouse country, is in the city for a short visit with old friends. He came to Salem in an early day and remained here until 1876, before the Indian war in that upper country. For many years Mr. Spurbuck sold pumps for A.
