Senator Fairbanks Will Not Be an Active Candidate

Chicago, June 17.—Congressman Hemenway, of Indiana, this afternoon made the following statement, which is believed to be semi-official "Fairbanks will accept the nomination, provided it is tendered to him. He will not do anything calculated to indicate that he is seeking it." In this connection it is said by friends of the administration that the program is to allow the matter to rest until Sunday, awaiting the arrival of other persons, when the delegates representing the administration will call on Fairbanks, and offer him their support for the nomination, and that Fairbanks will accept gracefully. Despite the general Fairbanks feeling, there is an undercurrent and talk of stampeding the convention for Speaker Cannon.

On the Anxious Seat. Chicago, June 17.—Two classes of people are here. Fairbanks supporters and a lot of exasperated politicians. With everything depending on some statement from him, the senator talks about the weather. Fairbanks seems to enjoy his peculiar situation, but even his friends do not. They are expected to know something, but are compelled to admit that they are not in his confidence. As a result, the situation is gradually becoming more irritating. Elkins' name is being circulated a little more freely, but it comes through Senator Scott, of West Virginia. The Hitt boom appears to be strictly local. Senator Cullom, who is behind Hitt, said to Fairbanks this morning: "What are you going to do? Have you made up your mind?" "I have nothing to say," answered Fairbanks. "Then I'm for Hitt," said the Illinois senator. "A good man, a very good man," remarked the Indianan. Cullom afterwards said: "I think he wants the nomination, but wants to be coaxed."
