The Sunday game was by long odds the best exhibition of the series, and was won by Salem. About 800 people witnessed the game, and were demonstrative when a good play was made on either side. Clynes stole what apparently was a perfectly safe hit from Williams in the third inning, by making a long run and nailing the ball just before it hit the ground. He received hearty applause, but at the end of the seventh inning Si Davis made an exceptionally long run and cheated McFarland out of a bingle. It was one of the best catches of the year, and when Si tried to sneak in to the bench without attracting attention he received an ovation lasting several minutes.

Emerson occupied the box for the Raglans, and he had all sorts of mysteries for the Blues. They failed to score until the eighth when Brisono was presented with a free ticket, McKune singled, and the little shortstop scored on a fielder's choice by Radford.

In the ninth they succeeded in making three more, and for a time it looked as if Eugene had a package of fireworks in their pocket, but it was a false alarm.

Salem made one in the third, fifth and seventh and four in the ninth. They touched McFarland pretty freely, although he had good support.

Umpire Derrick barely escaped being mobbed in the sixth inning by the Eugene players. He called Radford out at home and the whole team made a rush for the diamond. They shoved him around, and, for a time it looked pretty dubious for the umpire.
