GARLAND BUSINESS COLLEGE

New Educational Institution
to Be Established in
Marion County

The city of Silverton is to become the location of a business college, Mr. John B. Garland, of this city, having secured the Liberal University building, a fine new structure, and will open with full commercial courses on September 26th. Mr. Garland was trained under his father, the well-known educator, of this city, and then went and took a full course in the Valparaiso, Ind., business college, considered the best school of the kind in the United States. He has been teaching in the Northwest Normal college and Commercial School at Salem for the past five years. He is a young man of the highest ability and finest moral character, and will be the founder of a large school at Silverton, if he remains there for a number of years, as he now fully intends. He will build up a permanent school, and the prosperous country about there ought to support one. In bookkeeping, stenography and short hand, Mr. Garland is an expert, writing over 200 words a minute, Ben Pitman system, the oldest and best system of stenography known. Mrs. A. J. Garland will have charge of the English branches and penmanship, in which full courses for students will be taught. The Garlands have a fine record for

educational work, and their sons have naturally fallen into the same lines of work. The senior Garland served as principal at Brownsville, Salem and Wilbur, and, altogether, has done 30 years' of work in the public schools. In 1898 he established what is now the Northwest Normal School of Salem, and in this some thousand pupils have been enrolled and trained for life work, mostly educational. A natural teacher, the quality of imparting knowledge, so that it may be again readily transmitted to others, has become a second nature, and a labor of love. There were enrolled about 150 students the past year at Salem, and the establishment of the school at Silverton follows as a natural offshoot of the work here. Salem people who have sent their children to Prof. Garland's school will readily join with us in congratulating Silverton on acquiring a Garland college there. The educational and executive ability and the moral qualities are assured to make it a success.
