If this contract is made it will add another drawing feature to the numerous free attractions, as a balloon ascension is something that will be appreciated by the amusement loving public.

Prominent Man Insane.

Norris Humphrey, one of the best-known fruit growers and farmers in Lane county, and formerly considered one of the wealthiest, was examined before County Judge Kincaid this forenoon and pronounced insane. Drs. F. W. Prentice and W. Kuykendall were the examining physicians.

The unfortunate man was taken to the insane asylum at Salem this afternoon by Deputy Sheriff H. L. Brown and George Hunter.

The primary cause of Mr. Humphrey's insanity is financial troubles.

Several years ago he lost his fine fruit farm, below the city, together with other property, and since then his mind has been affected. He has taken treatment in various sanitariums, but it seemed to do him no good, and he gradually grew worse until he became uncontrollable. He is aged 50 years, and has a family, who have the sympathy of a large number of friends.—Eugene Guard.

due to chance, for the Republican party has commanded the confidence of the American people, for nearly two generations to a degree never before equalled in our history.

The Republican party entered upon its present period in complete supremacy in 1897. We have every right to congratulate ourselves, upon the work since accomplished. We then found the country after four years Democratic rule in an evil plight, the public credit lower, debt growing, standard values threatened, labor unemployed and confidence gone. We replaced the Democratic tariff law with its basis on free trade principles, garnished with sectional protection, by a consistent protective tariff and industry, freed from oppression, stimulated by encouragement and wise laws has expanded to a degree never before known. We firmly established the gold standard, then menaced with destruction, confidence returned to business and with confidence came an unexampled prosperity.

We refused to palter longer with the miseries of Cuba. We fought a quick victory war with Spain. We set Cuba free and governed the island for three years, then gave it to the Cuban people, with order restored and with ample revenues, with education, public health established, free from debt and connected with the United States by wise provisions. We have organized a government in Porto Rico and its people now enjoy peace, freedom, order prosperity.

In the Philippines we have suppressed insurrection established order, given to life and property a security never known there before. By our possession of the Philippines we were enabled to take prompt and effective action in the relief of the legations and a plain decisive part in preserving the integrity of China. The possession of a route for the Isthmian canal so long the dream of American statesmanship is now an accomplished fact.

We have passed laws bringing arid lands within cultivation, organized the army and put it in the highest state of efficiency, passed laws for the improvement and support of the militia, pushed forward the building of the navy.

Our administration in the great departments of government has been honest and efficient and where ever wrong doing has been discovered, the Republican administration did not hesitate to probe the evil and bring the offenders to justice. In this

record of achievement during the past eight years may be read as pledges of the party fulfilled. We promise to continue those policies and declare our adherence to the following principles:

Protection which guards and develops our industries, is a cardinal policy of the Republican party. The measure of protection should always at least equal the difference in the cost of production at home and abroad. We insist on the maintenance of the principle of protection and therefore the rates of duty should be readjusted only when conditions are so changed that the public interest demands their alteration, but this work cannot safely be committed to any other hands than the Republican party.

To intrust it to the Democratic party is to invite disaster.

We have extended widely our markets, and we believe in the adoption of all practical methods for further extension, including commercial reciprocity wherever reciprocal arrangements can be effected, consistent with the principles of protection.

We believe it to be the duty of the Republican party to uphold the gold standard, the integrity of value in our national currency.

We favor legislation which will encourage and build up the American merchant marine and we cordially approve the legislation enacted by the last congress which created the merchant marine commission.

A navy powerful enough to defend the United States against an attack and to uphold the Monroe doctrine, and watch over our commerce is essential to the welfare of the American people. To maintain such is a fixed policy of the Republican party. We cordially approve the attitude of the present congress regarding the exclusion of Chinese labor, and promise a continuance of the same.

We renew our former declaration that the civil service law be enforced. The liberal administration of the pension laws, is favored and the peaceful settlement of international differences by arbitration.

Just, equal protection of all citizens abroad is pledged.

Our great interests and growing commerce in the Orient render the condition of China of high importance to the United States. We cordially commend the policy pursued in that direction by the administrations of Presidents McKinley and Roosevelt.
