Duluth, Minn., June 22.—Owing to the late arrival of some of the delegates from the southern part of the state the Democratic state convention was rather late in getting under way this afternoon. The convention will select four delegates at large and 18 district delegates to the St. Louis convention. The most of the delegates to the state convention are without instructions in regard to a choice for the presidential nomination and a lively contest is expected on the convention floor between the Hearst element and its opponents. While the opposition to Hearst is largely favorable to Parker, its fight is for an un-instructed delegation.
