## PEEL CHITTIM BARK

### Benton County People Will Rake in the Shekels

Chittim peeling is in progress in the Alsea country, and a large part of the population is engaged in the industry, says the Corvallis Times. Five cents a pound is offered for the bark at Wade Malone's store, according to Frank Hughes, who was in town Monday, but nobody is selling at that figure, except in rare instances, when an occasional small lot goes at that price. Most of the peelers will hold for a better figure, and unless many of them get 10 cents a pound, they will hold over until another season.

It is estimated that seven-tenths of the remaining bark in the Alsea country will be peeled this season. Much of the bark on the railroad lands is being peeled. The chittim on these lands is disposed of to peelers on a basis of one-third to one-half for peeling, the bark to be delivered to the railroad company at Malone's store. Willis Vidto has been appointed agent of the railroad company, to look after their interests in the chittim business. So far practically no bark has been delivered.

### To Get the Oregon City Land Office Removed Here

A dispatch from Washington says the Oregon City land office will be removed to Portland within a short time. This is on account of the government owning a building in the latter place, while at the present time they are compelled to pay rent.

The land office, if it is removed from Oregon City, should be located in this city, where it will be close to the state land records. This is nearer the center of the district, and convenient to all portions of Western Oregon.

The government has its building in this city with plenty of room for the land office apartments. The business of men of Salem should bestir themselves without delay, and properly present the matter to the interior department.

## CARNIVAL HOSE RACES

### Portland People Offer Large Prizes for Many Events

The Portland Mardi Gras Carnival management has offered a large number of prizes for the hose races, which will be one of the features of that event. They are as follows:

Rules and regulations governing hose cart races under the auspices of the Mardi Gras Carnival, which will take place on the 7th and 8th of July. First race, hub and hub, shall be run 100 yards, two teams running together in heats, the winners of each heat shall run the final heat.

First prize will be \$50.  
Second prize will be \$25.  
If more than three teams contest in the races the prizes will be:  
First prize will be \$60.  
Second prize will be \$30.  
Third prize will be \$15.

Second race, wet test race, shall be run 75 yards to hydrant, lay 75 yards of hose, attach nozzle to plug and get water. Time of this race shall be taken from time of leaving scratch until water leaves nozzle.

First prize will be \$60.  
Second prize will be \$25.  
If more than three teams contest in the race the prizes will be:  
First prize, \$60.  
Second prize, \$30.  
Third prize, \$15.

Third race, dry test race, shall run 75 yards to hydrant, attach hose, lay 75 yards of hose and attach nozzle. Time of this race shall be taken from time of leaving scratch, until nozzle is attached to hose and laid on ground.

First prize will be \$40.  
Second prize will be \$20.  
If more than three teams contest in the race, the prizes will be:  
First prize will be \$50.  
Second prize will be \$25.  
Third prize will be \$10.

Fourth race, New York test race, shall run 75 yards to hydrant, attach hose to plug, lay 75 yards of hose, attach nozzle, obtain water, change second section of hose with last section of hose, attach nozzle and obtain water. Time of this race shall be taken from time of leaving scratch until water is obtained the second time.

First prize will be \$60.  
Second prize will be \$30.  
If more than three teams contest in the race the prizes will be:  
First prize will be \$50.  
Second prize will be \$25.  
Third prize will be \$15.

In all races where joints are coupled, there shall be at least one turn. The officials shall consist of our referee, three judges, three time keepers and one starter. Three officials shall be selected from towns with representative teams.

All starts of races shall be by pistol shots.  
All teams will be given passes to all parts of the carnival.  
All teams shall consist of 12 men.

## ELLA SHIPP DEAD

The silent hand of death gathered one of the city's fairest daughters last night, and carried her across the unknown river, from whence no mortal flesh returns.

Miss Mary Ellen Shipp passed to the great beyond at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frederick C. Shipp, corner of Commercial and Lefelle streets, at the age of 31 years and 5 days.

The uncertainty of life was never better illustrated than in the sad case herein chronicled. Suffering for a few weeks with slight indisposition, a sudden change alarmed her friends, and before they scarcely realized her condition, the lamp of life had flickered and the beam of light was forever extinguished.

The announcement of her death caused universal sorrow, for her bright and sunny presence had been an influence that will never be marred by the ravages of time. Her whole life was a pleasant page without a blot, and might be likened unto the fertile and fragrant oasis of the sands. While others mourned and scowled at fate, Miss Ella Shipp met life and duty with sweet smiles and cheering words. Hers was not the part of the pessimist and fault-finder, and they who knew her best loved her the most.

She was a great favorite at the Newport beach, where she spent her summer vacations, and was planning a trip to that resort for the near future.

She was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and with her parents, removed to this city 13 years ago. She is survived by two brothers, Watt of this city, and John, of Prineville.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock p. m. at the Leslie M. E. church, Rev. W. C. Kantner and Prof. J. T. Matthews officiating. Interment will had in the City View cemetery.
