ABOUT RAIL ROADS

Correspondent Discusses Proposed Portland Motor Line

Ed. Journal: While railroads are fine things, and we need plenty of them, yet, it is a source of apprehension to the conservatives, when they are agitated under conditions which will build up one town by tearing down another. This proposed line to Portland, which is to run in 50 minutes at a 50 cent ticket rate, can be made to work great damage to Salem interests. While a 50 minute trip will very likely not be put into effect, yet a trip consuming an hour and a quarter or even an hour and a half, one way, will give us all a temptation to "slide" down to Portland, and back before dinner, and get what we want. It will raise Cain with business in many ways. It will be a fine thing one way, but our merchants may suffer from this fine acquisition. On the other hand, of course, we can get some benefits from it. Portland can neither sleep nor eat her visitors during the fair, so we can get our money which we lose in a business way, out of the roomers which will be obliged to come to Salem.

I understand on the quiet that Portland, seeing that this road might work a hardship to Salem, has taken some steps to stop its construction, for fear some one might want to take the state house down with them some morning before the janitor got up. Portland seems to be alive to the fact that there are some individuals who would like to have the Capital City moved down there. But speaking of dogs, and railroads, it would not be a bad idea to look into the effects sure to follow such a convenience as a 50 minute and 50 cent trip to Portland. The railroad out of the Falls City district will only run about 20 miles an hour, but there is no chance for Salem to lose on it. Better give this road our first boost, because we might need her to offset the loss accruing to Salem from our high speed Portland line.

"Strangler" Knapp Case.
Columbus, O., June 24.—The case of Alfred A. Knapp, the alleged "strangler," who is under sentence of death, came up for hearing today in the state supreme court. Knapp is to be given a second trial and it is now being arranged to have the trial held early in the coming fall. It will take place at Hamilton.
The crime of which Knapp was convicted was the murder of his wife, Hannah Goddard Knapp. The murder was committed at Hamilton in December, 1902. In addition to this crime Knapp confessed to having strangled three other women and girls, two in Cincinnati and one in Indianapolis. He was suspected of the murder of several other women and girls. His defense was insanity.
