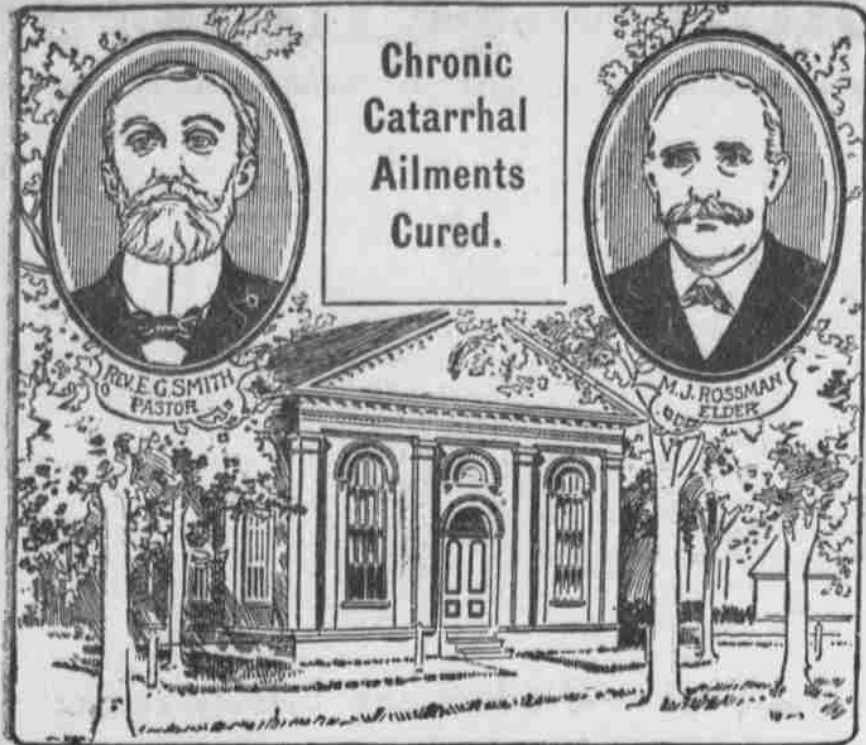

The salmon cannery men at Astoria are looking for a large run of fish the next few days. Up to this time they called a local physician, saying H. W. Goode, president of the Portland Electric Company, has been elected president of the Pacific Coast Electric Transmission Association, now in session at Monterey, California. The next meeting of the association will probably be held in Portland.

Heavy frosts are reported in the Grand Ronde valley. Garden patches were almost ruined, and winter wheat was damaged.

The Methodist church at Vancouver is celebrating its 50th anniversary. Delegates are present from all parts of Southwestern Washington.

Thos. W. Hammond, an Ashland boy, who has just completed his third year at West Point military academy, won first honors in a class of 120.

Work has been started on the new woolen mills at St. John. The building will be one of the best on the coast, and the mill will require 150 hands.

OYSTERS DOING WELL

Large Business Will Result From the Fine Yaquina Beds

"Investigation made a few days ago indicates that the large Eastern oysters planted on Yaquina bay early in the spring are thriving at a wonderful rate in their new home," said State Fish Warden Van Dusen, of Astoria, who has just returned from an official trip to the Salmon hatchery at Coos bay.

"This is good news for the fish commission, and should be good news to the people of Oregon, because it means an industry capable of bringing thousands of dollars to Oregon each year. There is no reason why Yaquina bay should not produce \$1,000,000 worth of oysters a year. That is but a starter as compared to Coos bay, which is equally adapted to the culture and which is three times the size of Yaquina bay."

From here we could easily get the oysters to St. Louis, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Omaha and intermediate points in competition with the Delaware and Chesapeake bay oysters.

"Furthermore, the success of the experiments means new communities in which hundreds of people can get good employment."

"That Coos bay was once a great oyster bed is proved by the dredging work that was done at Marshfield some years ago. At that time a channel six feet in depth was scooped out, and all the refuse removed was old oyster shells. One of the principal made streets of Marshfield is of old oyster shells. From reports, this bay was probably the greatest oyster bed in the world at one time—and that not in the distant past. Indians have told that there were an abundance of oysters at Coos bay prior to the big fire. The information coming down through the Indians is a belief that the big fire killed the oysters."

"As for myself, I am greatly pleased at the prospects of this new branch of the fisheries industry. The possibilities are great."

Warden Van Dusen was at Coos bay planning for the coming season's work at the salmon hatchery. More than 5,000,000 eggs were hatched last year, and fully that number and perhaps 5,000,000 eggs will be hatched this year.

Death of Eccentric Millionaire.

London, June 25.—Newcastle has lost one of its most eccentric and picturesque characters in the person of George Handyside, a self-made millionaire, who died there last week after a most romantic career. He began life as a cobbler's boy at Berwick, and died in his 80th year, the owner of vast tracts of residential and business property on Tyneside. He thought nothing of buying a whole street at once, demolishing the houses and erecting the buildings upon plans of his own. Every Monday he would perambulate his acres of tenemented property with bell and wheelbarrow collecting the rents. Those who answered the summons and brought out the money to him received discount in the shape of a few coppers. It was his proud boast that he had never employed a bailiff or made use of the county court in his life. He never asked for rent at a house in which the breadwinner was ill, and in case of death his first act was to call and tell the bereaved that she might continue to occupy the house rent free as long as she remained a widow.

Wants Francis to Run.

St. Louis, June 25.—John H. Martin, formerly street-cleaning commissioner of New York, has, on behalf of Tammany, asked President Francis, of the World's Fair, to allow his name to go before the Democratic convention as a candidate for President of the United States. Martin, it is understood, was sent to the city by Leander Murphy, of Tammany. The gossip at the New York state building at the fair today was that President Francis had given his consent. Tammany's plans are to allow several of the most prominently-mentioned candidates for nomination to make their fight, and then at the last moment bring forward Missouri's ex-governor as a compromise candidate.

President Francis, when asked about the story, simply smiled, and would not say a word.

Squadron Not Needed.

Washington, June 25.—Rear-Admiral Chadwick cables a confirmation of the release of Perdicaris and Varley, and states that the British minister has sailed for Gibraltar. He suggests that the American squadron sail Monday on a cruise.

YOUTH WANTED BLOOD

Drew Gun on Step-father and Was Brought to Town

Carl Johnson, aged 11 years, who has resided with his mother on Keizer bottom, was last evening brought to the court house, tied hand and foot, by his mother and step-father, who wanted him committed to the reform school. It seems the boy has been severely punished by those people for some time past, and yesterday rebelled to such an extent that he took a gun and got the drop on his step-father. His mother then approached him from the rear and disarmed him, when he was tied and brought to town. The child was considered as much sinned against as sinned, by the official, and was today sent to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society at Portland.

Portland, June 25.—The most worshipful lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Zook Masons of the Washington and Oregon jurisdiction, comprising four subordinate lodges of colored Masons, located in the cities of Spokane, Everett, Seattle and Portland, have been in session in this city for the past three days, and concluded their labors last night. J. C. Logan, grand master; B. R. Carle, deputy grand master; J. E. Hawkins, grand secretary; F. D. Thomas, grand treasurer; Crockett Ross, grand senior warden and B. J. Angelle, grand junior warden.

Grand chaplain, Rev. S. S. Freeman; grand marshal, F. A. Stokes; master of ceremonies, C. S. Parker; grand orator, E. H. Holmes.

Train Left Track.

Delaware, Ohio, June 25.—The Big Four 20th Century Limited express southbound, jumped the track at Delaware station today. The engineer and fireman were killed, and the baggage-master fatally injured. The whole train left the track.
