OREGON STILL AHEAD

Salem Boy Designs Roosevelt Campaign Button

Oregon boys are continually "bobbing up," and the latest to attract attention is Sam VanDersal, who has brought out the Roosevelt campaign button for 1904. The button made its appearance in almost every part of the United States, and for originality has never been surpassed. Sam was born and raised in Marion county, and several years ago went East to seek his fortune. He occupied a mediocre place, so far as his friends knew, until recently, when Eastern papers commenced to exploit his campaign buttons. The Kansas City Star of June 12th says:

The first of the campaign buttons for 1904 has made its appearance, and it is based on the ranch days of Theodore Roosevelt. Samuel Van Dersal, a Kansas City man, is the originator. Mr. Van Dersal was publisher of the Montana and Dakota state brand books when Mr. Roosevelt has ranches in that country. In each book are registered thousands of brands, and among them are the three used by the ranchman who became President. One is a triangle, another the Elkhorn and the third the Maltese cross. Mr. Van Dersal recently sent to North Dakota and received in return the original applications filed by Mr. Roosevelt and registering his brands in the state capitol at Bismarck. One of them, the Elkhorn brand application is here reproduced. When Mr. Roosevelt sold his ranches he also transferred his brands to Ferris Brothers, Medora N. D., who still use them.

The button shows a red steer, wearing the three Roosevelt brands, and bears the inscription: "Don't be a Maverick—Join the Presidential Roundup, 1904."

Roosevelt had two ranches in the Bad Lands of Dakota. One was eight miles up the Little Missouri river from Medora. This was known as the Chimney Butte ranch, but the cowboys called it the Maltese Cross ranch, because all its cattle were branded with the cross. Thirty miles down the river from Medora was the Elkhorn ranch also owned by Mr. Roosevelt. There were fine buildings on the Elkhorn, but the New Yorker preferred to live on the Chimney Butte although the house was a one-story affair of logs with three rooms, a kitchen, a living room and a room for the owner and his ranch manager Sylvane Ferris, who, with his brother now owns the Roosevelt lands.

Medora is not much of a town now, but it has a history. Twenty years ago the late Marquis de Mores, who was killed in the Sudan by the Mahadists, established the town and named it after his wife, who, before her marriage, was Medora von Hoffman of New York. Pretty nearly every one hears of the schemes of the marquis. He was going to raise his own cattle, slaughter them in his own abattoir and sell the meat in his own stores in every city in the land. He tried, he failed and he left Medora.

Roosevelt came here a year before the marquis and started in to do some reforming. The "bad men," who abounded hereabouts in those days, were just ready to kill him when de Mores waited along and monopolized all the attention. The Frenchman at once became as obnoxious to the cattle thieves as the New Yorker and the would-be killers concentrated upon him. But de Mores killed two of them and wounded half a dozen more, making the first active move against the toughest gang of cattle thieves in the northwest.

After de Mores faded away some of the former members of the gang made spasmodic efforts to return to the old order of things, and they were aided secretly by the then sheriff. Roosevelt showed them that he had good stuff in him. He called a meeting of all the ranchers in the country, the sheriff was summoned, and with his hand on his gun Roosevelt told the official that he was a liar and a horse thief. It was swift language to use in that country, but the sheriff saw that he was against a bad man, took his medicine and resigned. That was a big feather in Roosevelt's cap.

In other ways he showed that the ways of the country were not too hard for him. He made it a practice to buy the buckiest, ugliest cow ponies he could find in the country, and when the boys kicked against riding such nasty beasts he would pick out the toughest one in the lot and ride it. Often he was thrown, but eventually he conquered. Once four of his ribs were smashed in by the first fall, but he said nothing and finally sub-

dued the brute. If a New Yorker could ride the horses the cowboys argued that they should be able to manage them.

It is the same way with shooting. Mr. Roosevelt cannot see a dozen yards away without his eyeglasses, but he can do some fancy shooting that would win applause in a Wild West show. He is not so good with a revolver, but in long range work with rifles there is no man on the two ranches who can beat him. He is a good man at wrestling and is handy with the gloves, being well up in all the tricks of both sports. In friendly bouts he has taken in some of the biggest men on the ranch and has shown that he is no tender chicken.

The Creffield Reward.

Sheriff Burnett is sending circulars abroad in the effort to locate Creffield. Circulars give notice that a reward of \$350 is in the sheriff's hands to be paid for the arrest and conviction of the fugitive apostle. Of the sum, \$200 is offered outright for the arrest and an additional \$150 for the arrest and conviction. The \$200 is a sum contributed by private subscription, largely from persons whose families have become victims of the fallacious teachings of the bogus high priest. Of the other \$150, \$100 is offered by the county court, and the balance by S. L. Kline. It is figured that the increased reward will interest sheriffs and detectives in the search for Creffield with a possibility that his hiding place might be discovered. Contrary to reports current, the officers have no clue to his whereabouts, and but a vague idea of where he might be. Brooks and Levens are known to be at Seattle, but the officers are convinced that their chief is not with them.

The circulars sent out by Sheriff Burnett announce that the reward will hold good for the period of one year. They also give a description of Creffield, which is as follows:
