

OWN BEING MOVED

Wadsworth Nevada Picked
up and Carted Thirty
Two Miles

Sparks, Nev. June 27.—The greater portion of the population of the town of Wadsworth has moved to the new town of Sparks, 32 miles away. Men picked up their homes by the horses, loaded them on flat cars and had them carried down to Sparks, where they have planted them again. For the past a long procession of horses, dogs and cats have moved in the section of the new town, and Wadsworth threatens to become simply a part of the surrounding prairie.

The reason for this strange proceeding is that the Southern Pacific recently decided to abolish Wadsworth as a division point, and to change its line, leaving Wadsworth in wilderness.

making the change of the division from Wadsworth to Sparks, the Southern Pacific decided that it would

have to make some concessions to those of its employees who owned homes in Wadsworth, and who would be forced to abandon them under the changed conditions. Some blocks of land near the company's new shops in Sparks were accordingly cut up into lots, and the company conducted a drawing. The numbers of the lots were written on slips of paper and thrown into a hat—then each employee drew a piece of property.

The company then offered to haul the houses down free of charge, and so for several days car after car of houses and household goods rolled into Sparks. The entire town has been bustling about, endeavoring to get settled in its new quarters.

AN UNUSUAL FROST.

DOWIE GETS RECRUIT

Rich Swedish Girl Joins Ranks
of Chicago Prophet

New York, June 27.—Bringing with him a young and beautiful Swedish noblewoman, whose wealth is to be devoted to the uses of Zion City, John Alexander Dowie, the self-styled "Elijah III," returned from Australia and Europe on the Cunarder Lucania. With the Chicago prophet were his wife and the "Unkissed," Dr. A. J. Gladstone Dowie, the latter glorying in the fact that neither Europe nor Australia could take that badge of courage away from him.

Never was a jewel guarded so assiduously as the mysterious young woman convert. On the passenger list she figured as Miss Ruth Hofer, but that is said to be her "nom de Zion," as it were. She is not yet 25, her cheeks are red with the blush of youth and her daintily little fingers and aristocratic manner betray the fact that she is an uncommon convert.

As if hypnotized, she followed the truculent figure of the white-bearded prophet everywhere, and during the voyage successfully resisted the battery of eyes directed at her by the younger male passengers. Every attempt to scrap an acquaintance with her was intercepted by the prophet and his son. Their efforts betrayed so much alarm that all of the younger male passengers joined forces to worry the prophet day and night. Finally, at his commands, she withdrew to her cabin, and did not appear on deck again during the last two days of the voyage.

the baggage under the supervision of young Dowie, who took off his coat and waistcoat during the operation. In all Dowie brought about \$1000 in personal property with him.

Shipping Cherries in Oak Barrels.

Our orchardists are complaining that the cherry crop is so prolific this year that a great deal of the fruit will not be picked from the trees. From the Eugene Guard we learn of a new method being pursued in that city for the shipment of cherries to the Eastern market. It might be adopted with success by fruit dealers in this vicinity. It is as follows:

"A carload of oak barrels has just arrived from Portland for the Allen Canning and Evaporating Company. These barrels will be filled with Royal Ann cherries, which will be shipped to the East, where they will be sold to liquor houses, and similar places, to be used in cocktails and other drinks.

"The cherries will be shipped whole and with the stems on. Some kind of a preparation was put on them as they were sealed in the barrels, and when they are opened they are in splendid shape, and are sold as French cherries."—The Dalles Chronicle.

Anxiety for Wilhelmina.

The Hague, June 27.—Grave anxiety is again felt regarding the health of Queen Wilhelmina. The popular apprehension is not allayed by the issuance of official bulletins intended to be of a reassuring character. It is generally known that the queen, since her arrival at Het Loo, has avoided all fatiguing exercises, never walking a great distance or riding on horseback, and scarcely leaving the immediate vicinity of the castle, all of which is in striking contrast to the queen's usual habits.

Water Getting Low.

The water in the Willamette river is getting to be somewhat low, and the river steamers plying on the upper river are compelled to work carefully when heavily loaded. They are still making trips as far as Corvallis, but it is thought this will not last very much longer. A large amount of freight is constantly being carried by the river fleet, and if the boats should cease coming up the river to Albany and Corvallis, their absence from this part of the river would be generally regretted.—Albany Herald.
