Council Reconsidered Action Regarding Claim of Ex- pert Richardson

The city council met in adjourned session Monday night. The report adopted at the previous meeting regarding the claim of S. T. Richardson for experting the city books, was rescinded, and the claim allowed in the full amount of \$420. Those voting aye were Acheson, Walker, Downing, Crossan, Hubbard, Hughes, Smith, Young, Noes, Bayne Catlin, Sims.

The Minto Island gravel contract was considered, and, on motion, a special committee, consisting of Aldermen Bayne, Downing and Hubbard was appointed to look after the city's rights. Minto Bros. yesterday cut the ferry boat rope, and the city will be unable to get gravel from that source. They say that until the city enters into a contract with them, they will not allow another load of gravel to be removed.

The present contract is as follows: This agreement made this 13th day of March, 1899, between John Minto and M. A. Minto, his wife, parties of the first part, and the City of Salem, party of the second part. Witnesseth, that said parties of the first part for

and in consideration of one dollar to them paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged do for themselves, their heirs and assigns, by these presents, grant unto to the said party of the second part the right and privilege to remove gravel to be used on its public streets and highways from the northeast end of the gravel bar situated in the Willamette River, subject to the following conditions and reservations hereinafter mentioned, which bar said parties of the first part claim ownership, by reason of it being an accretion to the main land of Minto Island, which they own. That said gravel bar is described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point 74.27 chains north and 69.61 chains east of the corner to sections 28, 29, 32 and 33 in township 7 south, range 3 west of Willamette Meridian, in Marion county, state of Oregon, and running thence north 78 deg. 30 min. east 27 chains; thence north 76 degrees, east 6.11 chains; thence north 73 degrees, east 2.47 chains; thence north 66 degrees, east 3.70 chains; thence north 53 degrees, 30 minutes east 2.55 chains; thence north 46 degrees, east 5.15 chains; thence south 80 degrees west 10.00 chains; thence south 84 degrees, west 7.14 chains; thence south 74 degrees, 45 minutes, west 5.11 chains; thence south 56 degrees, 30 minutes west 3.43 chains; thence south 46 degrees, west 2.76 chains; thence south 26 degrees, 15 minutes, west 3.64 chains; thence north 88 degrees, 30 minutes, east 1.28 chains; thence north 74 deg. east 2.61 chains to the place of beginning, and containing 12.67 acres of land, more or less, and being parts of section 21, 22, 27 and 28, in t 7 s, r 3 w of Willamette Meridian, in Marion county, State of Oregon.

That the right to remove said gravel is granted on the conditions that the removal if it will not interfere in any way with the grant made by said parties of the first part to the Salem Water Company on the 20th of November, A. D. 1897, and recorded on page 1, book 68 of Records of Deeds of Marion county, Oregon, nor interfere with any works or constructions said Salem Water Company may have made or may make under said grant. That said party of the second part, in removing said gravel, will do so in such a manner as to cause the least injury to said bar, and that, in conveying the gravel from said bar to the mainland of the shore, that it will use a flatboat,

or similar construction to float the same across.
