FILIPINOS ARE NOT READY

For Self Government According to Taft

Doctrine of Consent of Governed Cannot Be Literally Construed

Cambridge, June 28.—In a carefully prepared address Secretary of War Taft today discussed, before the Harvard Law School Alumni association, some phases of the Philippine situation. Passing to the constitutionality of the present administration, the secretary said that the words, "consent of the governed," were not intended to be literally construed, and declaring there were numerous instances in our history where the consent of the governed had not been obtained. He spoke of the great work of education that was being carried on, something essential to the preparation of the people for any kind of self government. Of Aguinaldo, Taft said that the result of his government was oppression, arbitrary action and disturbance. He said the Filipinos were not ready for self government, and concluding with this statement: "If they are fit for self government, then I agree the declaration ought to be made and we ought to turn the islands over." He was opposed, however, to any promises, contingent upon what might happen in the future.

GREAT SHORTAGE IN OREGON HOP CROP

Hundreds of Acres of New Planting Will Be Plowed up--Result of Several Causes

The Oregon hop crop will be several thousand bales short, and the decreased production may reach one-half to one-third of the total of a normal year. A drive through the many yards of this and Polk counties will substantiate this statement.

The vines are sickly looking and lack vitality. The arms are short and puny, and do not possess the usual healthy color. A good rain within the next few days might help some, but it will never undo all the damage.

Another bad feature is the death of a large number of new yards. This is caused by the roots being cut when they were in sap and then failed to take hold. Reports from a number of the largest yards shows a bad condition throughout the Willamette valley.

The yard of Horst Bros., above town, is in poor condition, and will be short. Their yard near Eola is in even poorer shape.

Al. German will have probably two-thirds of a crop, and he has the best yard in the vicinity.

The Walling yard is bad, and will not yield any where near up to the standard.

The Gilbert & Patterson yard is reported by Manager Brophy as being in very poor shape, and from 15,000 to 20,000 pounds short of last year.

Massey & Ruggles have a new 20-acre yard in bad shape. They will probably plow them up.

The old yard of Jas. Finney is bad, on account of many missing hills.

Reports from the W. H. Egan yard say that it will be half a crop.

T. A. Livesley has 50 acres of new hops, and they are about worthless, according to report.

A portion of the Ed. Herren yard is in fair condition, but the total will be short one-half.

The Croisan yard is getting along fairly well, but does not come up to previous years.

Krebs Bros. will plow up the last 15 acres of new hops set out. The other yards are in fair condition, but nothing to brag on. They expect about half a crop.

The condition remains about the same, when The Journal predicted a short crop, and much damage to the roots.

The amount of old hops on hand will not reach over 3800 bales of the 1903 crop now in the hands of the Oregon growers and dealers.

Other crops will be short on account of the dry weather. The government weather report says:

"The past week has been dry, with cool nights and drying winds. All growing crops need rain, and, unless it comes soon, spring grain and the second crop of hay will be unusually light. A heavy frost occurred Friday morning in the eastern high level sections, and tender vegetables were badly nipped and some grain was damaged. On the same morning light frosts were reported in a number of localities west of the Cascades, but they did no material harm.

"Fall grain is filling nicely, but spring grain is heading short. Haying has made rapid progress during the week, but nearly everywhere the returns show a falling off from previous expectations. Pastures are drying up, but feed is still good, and stock continues in excellent condition.

"Hops, gardens, field onions, potatoes and corn, although needing rain, have made fairly good progress during the week. Early potatoes are being marketed. The season, so far, has been remarkably free from insect pests.

The strawberry crop turned out fairly satisfactory, although it is not so heavy as it would have been had there been more rain earlier in the season. Apples continue promising, and the outlook for peaches is fairly good. The yield of cherries is better than expected."

The largest cleanup reported at Portland to interested parties is \$130,000 from the Dry Creek mine in the Nome district.

Senator Mitchell will return to Portland about the middle of July.
