

PROHIBITION NATIONAL CONVENTION

**It Opens With Twelve
Hundred Delegates**

**One Convention Where the
Opening Prayer Is Not
a Mere Formality**

Indianapolis, June 29.—Twelve hundred delegates, many of them women, the hall by no means filled, and plenty of room in the galleries, was the dimensions of the national prohibition convention.

"There is one political party where offering prayer is not merely a formality," said Chairman Stewart, as he introduced Rev. Geo. H. Peake, of Sandusky, Ohio. W. S. Doane delivered an address of welcome, predicting that the prohibition candidate would poll half a million votes in November. At the conclusion of his speech the Virginia delegation called for cheers for Doane, "the next vice-president," which were given with a will. Stewart replied informally to the address, branched off into a prohibition stump speech, declaring the other parties have no real issue, and then submitted to a temporary organization. Hoar Castle, of Pittsburg, chairman; W. S. Calderwood, of Minneapolis, secretary. Castle held the closest attention of the delegates in a carefully prepared keynote speech.

THREE MEN CONVICTED

**Two for Horse Stealing and
One for Assault**

Albany, June 29.—Elmer Ausbun and Victor Howard, the two young Lebanon men who were recently arrested on the charge of stealing a horse from Fred Blyeu, plead guilty in the circuit court yesterday morning to the indictment, and waived time for sentence. Judge Burnett at once sentenced the two to serve one year each in the penitentiary.

George Hughes, who was on Monday indicted on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, plead not guilty to the charge, and he will have his hearing in a few days.

The case of R. R. Ryan & Co., Salem real estate men, against Carl Brietzke, an action for the recovery of a real estate commission, was tried by a jury as follows:

A. O. Condit and J. R. Wyatt appeared for R. R. Ryan & Co., and Bonham & Martin for Brietzke. The case was one that was tried at the last term of court, and resulted in a hung jury. The action was brought for the recovery of a real estate commission. The land in question had been placed in the hands of the firm for sale, and the evidence showed that as a result of the efforts of the firm of brokers a buyer had been found, that later the owner had withdrawn the land from sale, and immediately after had sold it to the purchaser provided by the brokers for the original sum asked for the land, less the commission. The action was brought for \$285 commission, and at the conclusion of the plaintiff's case the defense moved a non-suit, and, failing in this, introduced testimony. When the case was submitted the jury was out but a few minutes, when a verdict was returned into court for the amount asked for, \$285 and costs.

FILIPINOS GAIN HONORS

**Given Degrees by the Oldest
of American Universities**

New Haven, June 29.—A drizzling rain today caused the abandonment of the elaborate procession at the Yale commencement. Degrees were conferred on 624 candidates. Honorary degrees were conferred on the following: Brothers of law, Don Gayetano Arellano, chief justice of the Philip-

pines; M. A. Halstead, professor of surgery of John Hopkins; R. W. Fore, first tenement house commissioner, of New York; Chas. Van Hook, geologist of Wisconsin; United States Judge Holt, Doctor of divinity on C. King, president of Oberlin; Stuart Means, rector of St. Johns, at New Haven. Doctor of music, Frank DeRosch, of New York. Among those who are to be masters of arts is Pedro DeTravara, senior member of the Filipino commission on Filipino affairs. This is the first important recognition of the Islanders by the American university.
