MILITIA NEARLY READY

Will Leave for American Lake Encampment Next Week

The members of the Salem militia company are busy preparing for the first encampment to be held outside the borders of the state.

The company has been working hard for several weeks under Captain Chas. Murphy, and they present a fine appearance when at drill. They will leave here on the morning of July 7th on a special train, and will go direct to Tacoma, near where the encampment will be held.

The national guard of Washington and Idaho will also be in camp, together with the troops from the Department of the Columbia. The men expect to be much benefitted by the experience, and are planning great times for the 10 days that they will be absent.

The following order from the adjutant-general's office, headquarters, Oregon National Guard, Portland, Oregon, give all general information:

Paragraph I, General Orders No. 11, C. S., these headquarters, is hereby amended to include Troop A.

II. The uniform and equipment to be worn by the troops of this state at the camp of maneuvers, at American Lake, Washington, will be as follows:

For officers—Olive drab uniform, campaign hat with cord, blue shirt, puttee leggings, overcoat, sabre and belt. For enlisted men Khaki blouse and trousers, campaign hat with cord, leggings, blue shirt, government shoes, poncho, overcoat, blanket, shelter half complete, haversack, mess kit, canteen and tin cup.

Officers are permitted to take their khaki uniform in addition to their olive drab.

III. The following method of wearing equipment is authorized and prescribed:

When the troops of this state are turned out in the field equipment the haversack will be worn on the left side, both straps under the waist belt, the canteen on the right side, straps over the haversack straps, front and rear straps over waist belt, the tin cup to be hung by its handle to the rear canteen strap, opening of the cup towards the body.

Blanket rolls should consist of blankets, poncho, overcoat, shelter half, shelter poles, pins and ropes, one suit of underwear, two pairs stockings, one pair shoes, and will be worn on the left shoulder. Comb, tooth brush and towel will be carried in the haversack. The triangular part

of shelter tent half is folded in; the blanket is then placed on half, and other articles placed on blanket, so that no poles or pins will fall or bend. The articles are rolled by two or three men, if possible, into the tightest possible roll, commencing along longest side of rectangle. The ends are then brought together and tied by guy rope of shelter tent.

IV. State pay will be allowed, the United States army paying regular army pay, the state paying the difference.

V. Horses will be allowed as follows: Third Infantry, two horses for mounted orderly; Troop A, one horse to each enlisted man participating. Each mounted officer one horse.

VI. The baggage allowance to be transported will be as follows: Headquarters, 200 pounds; mounted officers, 150 pounds; company officers, 125 pounds; companies, troop and field artillery, one field oven, one mess chest, one field desk and camp equipment.

Commanding officers will be held strictly accountable for weight in excess mentioned above.

II. Upon receipt of this order they are hereby directed to proceed from their home stations to Portland in time to report in person to Lieutenant Wm. M. Denny, 3d Infantry, at Multnomah county armory, Thursday, June 30, 1904, at 8:30 o'clock p. m.

III. Pay and rations will be allowed for six (6) days.

IV. This team will leave Portland, Friday, July 1, 1904, at 8:30 o'clock
