Mr. Goodale was elected and as soon as his bond, which is fixed at \$20,000, is filed and approved he will enter upon his duties.

POLICE SOLDIERS WATER

Methods Employed in Ejecting Catholic Priests From France

Nantes, July 1.—In ejecting the Premonstrat and Capucine orders of Roman Catholic priests today, a battalion of infantry, and a detachment of dragoons assisted the police, while the firemen deluged the monastery, and took out the occupants by means of ladders, the doors having been barricaded. Great disorder prevails in the district.

OREGON'S POOR EXHIBIT.

Condemned by a Prominent Oregon Man as Not Representative.

The little group of cheap politicians who forced themselves upon the state and federal government to take charge of the Oregon exhibit at St. Louis are getting some hard hits.

State Senator Holman, who has just returned from the St. Louis fair, says: "I don't like to talk about the Oregon exhibit for publication," continued the speaker, after a pause, "for I was disappointed in it. It seems to me that it does not convey enough information to the people of the East and Middle West, who knew nothing of us, who are, in fact, as green in knowledge of things Western as they think we are in fact."

"There is a good fish and game exhibit, and a good exhibit of woods, but these tell no stories for Oregon. The visitor sees a big apple, and says so, he gazes at one of the pieces of timber and says 'there's a big board,' and lets it pass."

"The Oregon building is where we are weak. There is no information there. An Easterner looking in sees a log cabin containing a panther hide and some Indian pictures, and there is nothing to tell whether it is an exhibition of the way in which the Oregonian lives or a representation of the Lewis and Clark cabin. The Eastern people don't know about Lewis and Clark. That expedition is as vague as Daniel Boone is to us."

"What the Oregon building needs is some one to talk for Oregon, and some pictures or materials to demonstrate the resources of soil and climate. The walls of the Oregon building are bare, while those of the California building are lined with pictures of farm and vineyard and field. The rooms are filled with easy chairs, papers are on the table, and claret punch and tea are served the tired visitors, while two men who can talk, discourse on the advantages of California."

"That is what Oregon needs. It must have some way to distribute information, or we will get no good from the St. Louis fair."

RURAL MAIL RULES.
