EX-CON LEFT PRISON GATES

And Hastened to Steal a Watch From One Yates

Charles Wright was arrested by Chief Gibson last evening, charged with stealing a watch from John Yates. The watch was taken from the person of Mr. Yates while he was standing at the carnival grounds on Wednesday evening. The ring was twisted from the stem, and the owner did not miss it for some time.

Yesterday morning Wright sold the watch for \$2, and the police at once started on his trail. He was arrested late in the evening, and committed to the city jail.

Wright is an old-timer, and this is not the first time he has been in trouble. He was released from the penitentiary a short time ago, and has been giving the police more or less trouble ever since. Another ex-convict and himself have been the subject of considerable gossip, involving two married women. He is a bad actor, and the police were fortunate in picking him up before he committed other depredations.

Wright is about 33 years of age and has a bad record. He first entered the Oregon penitentiary July 3, 1899, when he was sentenced from Umatilla county for larceny. He was under the care of the state for two years, minus time for good behavior.

He enjoyed his freedom but a few days when he was arrested for stealing a horse, after a hot chase into Yamhill county, and was brought back and sentenced to four years, and was admitted on June 4, 1901. Three weeks ago he was released, and has been under the surveillance of the officers, who were satisfied that he would be in trouble before many weeks.

Before coming to Oregon he was in the Walla Walla prison on the charge of larceny, and is said to be an old-timer in the East.

Co. from Portland to Clatsop and North Beach points are interchangeable and will be honored on trains of this company in either direction between Portland and Astoria.

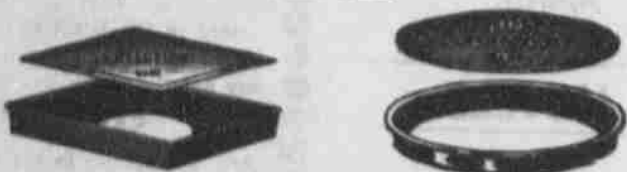
