CARNIVAL INTEREST CONTINUES

Big Snake "Samson" Enjoyed a Good Sized Meal of Live Chickens

The carnival was a busy place last night, and the crowds lasted until nearly midnight. The confetti dealers had a continuation of the warfare, and sold "a bushel for a nickel." Some effort was made during the early part of the evening to stop the throwing of the paper, but, after an attempt, it was found to be useless and the battle was resumed with renewed vigor.

The big snake Samson was found to hungry last evening, and Mr. McHenry, his owner, purchased a dozen chickens for the reptile. After a little coaxing he devoured six nice big fat Plymouth Rocks, and was covered up for the night. His keeper says that when he is hungry it can always be told by the way he moves around. He is active and hard to keep in his pen, while at other times he is perfectly docile and sleepy.

The Electric Palace was filled several times during the afternoon and evening, and the people were well satisfied with the entertainment.

The high dives and acrobatic exhibitions were up to their usual high standard, and were watched by large crowds.

Each night seems to add to the crowds, and if the interest continues until tomorrow night, the attendance will be a record-breaker at Salem carnivals.

Great Run on Bank.

Aurora, Ill., July 1.—Several hundred people yesterday besieged the doors of the German-American national bank, the cashier of which, by his own confession, is short \$90,000 in his accounts. For an hour there was no diminution of the crowd.

Huge stacks of gold, silver and currency were piled on the counters. A number of prominent citizens entered the bank during the rush and made large deposits.

In three hours the run was apparently over. The directors said that \$32,744 had been withdrawn. The defaulter is a physical wreck. For three years he has borne the ceaseless strain in trying to hide the hole in the bank's reserve fund, while the hole had been growing broader and deeper.

In his confession of the shortage, Cashier Plain attributed his downfall to "unfortunate speculation."

Fairbanks Will Not Resign.

Washington, July 1.—Word was received in Washington to the effect that Senator Fairbanks will not resign his seat in the senate until after the election in November. He wants to be sure of the vice-presidency before relinquishing the office he now holds.

As yet Fairbanks has made no plans for the fall campaign, but it is expected that he will go on the stump during September and October, particularly in doubtful states.

Mayor Jones Ill.

Toledo, O., July 1.—Mayor Jones, of Toledo, who was stricken with pleuro-pneumonia some days ago, is in a critical condition. His physician says there is a slight chance for recovery.

Armenians Butchered.

Constantinople, July 1.—A large caravan of Armenians were overtaken and butchered by Kurds and Turkish regulars on Thursday. All the adults were killed and the boys and girls carried off.
