BRIDGE

Unknown Man Committed Suicide in Willamette River

An unknown man jumped from the high wagon bridge, which spans the Willamette river at this city, and was drowned before he could be rescued, on the afternoon of the Fourth.

John Gantenbein, Austin Fishburn and Frank Haas were in a boat, about 300 yards from the bridge, when they heard a heavy splash in the water. They could see a white speck on the water, and were soon apprised of the fact that a man was in the river. The shouts of a number of others attracted their attention, and they realized that a tragedy was being enacted. Rowing the boat swiftly down the current they came within 30 feet of the man, but when he feared that he was about to be rescued, he raised his arms and disappeared forever from eight.

The only trace that the rash man left was a worn and tattered straw hat, which floated on the water, and was picked up by the men in the boat. It is a plain hat, Fedora shape, with the trade mark "Girard" on the inside. The size is 6%, and the lot number

From the description furnished by the men in the boat and others who were on the shore and the bridge approach, the man was about 50 years old and bald headed. He looked over his shoulder several times when the row boat was approaching him, and continued to swim down the channel, until the men were almost within reach of him, when he deliberately refused to use his arms, and went down, He seemed to have some difficulty in sinking, but held his head under the water. He was in his shirt sleeves and wore a light-colored vest.
