During the past four or five years requests have been made to the councilmen for such protection, but nothing but promises were ever received. Now that South Salem is a part of the city proper, it is but just and right that such protection should be given us.

HOUND KICKED GROUND

Great Southern Oregon Gold Discovery Made by a Dog

It was the contrary antics of a common "cutis" sort of deerhound that caused 18-year-old Harry Briggs to make the recent rich discovery on Grayback mountain, in Josephine county. In fact, the dog really kicked up the earth that brought to light the quartz stringer streaked with gold, and has since developed into a four-foot ledge with \$400,000 in sight.

This is the story told by a prominent mining man from that section, now in the city, and he received the information from the sister-in-law of young Briggs. Deer have been hunted so long in the mountains of Southern Oregon that they have become wild and wary, and a popular way is to put a hound on fresh tracks, and chase the deer along its regular trail, while the hunter lies in ambush to shoot it.

Early in the morning young Briggs left his Sucker Creek home and went 10 or 12 miles back into the mountains among the Grayback peaks. He was accompanied by the family dog, a deerhound that had been in service for many years. In a brushy spot, covered with leaves, fresh tracks and deer signs were discovered, but the dog was contrary, and would not follow the scent. The young master became angry, and severely chastised the dog with a stick, and in the scuffle the dog scratched up the leaves and earth, and brought to view a chunk of quartz. When Harry Briggs picked up the piece of rock it was discovered to be fairly lined with gold. Further investigation showed that it came from a rich stringer, and almost on top of the ground.

Sixty Men Start From This City for American Lake Camp

Company M, Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard, left this morning at 6 o'clock for American Lake, near Tacoma, Wash., for a two weeks' encampment.

The armory was a busy place last evening. Lieut. Holman had charge of issuing the necessary supplies, and he was doing all kinds of business. Every man is supposed to have a full equipment when he starts for camp, and he is compelled to sign a receipt for the goods issued. In addition he must deposit 25 cents for the metallic regimental ornaments that he wears on his hat and blouse. This is required simply as a guarantee that they will be returned at the close of the encampment, when the money will be handed back to the depositor.

The special train carried the Albany company, and also picked up the Woodburn contingent. The boys were dressed in regulation brown khaki uniforms, with blanket roll, shelter tent, and other field equipments. They carried one day's travel rations, and they will arrive at the lake in time to pitch their tents tonight.
