Tom Richardson of the Development League Will Speak

Forger Escaped.

A dispatch from Ashwood, Crook county, says: Ira Cornett, the forger, who escaped from officers at Centerville, was later captured at Prineville, and then escaped from Sheriff Huston, of Linn county, at Antelope Saturday, has been caught at Ashwood. The prisoner is insane.

The escape happened near Shaniko at 1 o'clock in the morning. The sheriff was obliged to leave the stage for a few moments, leaving Cornett, who was handcuffed, in charge of a passenger. He jumped from the stage, and succeeded in getting away up a canyon. As the sheriff had to be home to turn over the office to his successor, he left the recapture of Cornett in the hands of officers here.

Just what line of activity will engage Mr. Tuthill in the immediate future is not yet known, but he may resume the work of teaching after a good rest.

COURT HOUSE QUIET

Business Dull at the Marion County Seat of Justice

Today is a very quiet day at the Marion county court house, and few people are attending any of the courts.

Judge Burnett, in department No. 1, overruled a motion of plaintiff in the case of W. H. Odell vs. W. B. Morse, and adjourned sine die.

The county court is busy auditing bills, having over 500 accounts to scrutinize, and it is probable that the greater part of next week will be consumed before the work of the term can be completed.

Mrs. Wm. Bird, of Mt. Angel, was this morning committed to the asylum. Mrs. Bird is 41 years old, and the derangement is supposed to be the result of an injury to the head, she having been committed once before, about two years ago.

In probate court Judge Scott approved the bond of A. O. Condit, as executor of the estate of the late Elizabeth Boise. The amount of the bond is \$20,000, and J. H. Albert appears as surety.

Chas. F. Hein, as administrator of the estate of Lewis Everett, filed his final account, and August 10th is set as the time of hearing the same.

Baseball Talk.

The Albany Democrat, in discussing the baseball situation, says:

"There will be no more games. The receipts do not justify a continuance of the league.

"The present indebtedness of the Albany club is between \$300 and \$400. Eugene owes Albany \$128, probably netable. The second half of the Albany stock will be called for."

Meat and Sugar Contracts Let by the Board

The board of trustees of the Oregon insane asylum met this morning for the purpose of opening bids for supplies for the coming six months. The only bids awarded were for sugar and meats. The sugar bids were alike from the wholesale houses at Portland and the order was divided between them.

On meats E. C. Cross bid \$5.25 on beef and mutton, Steusloff Bros. \$4.40 on beef and mutton, Geo. Fendrich bid \$4.50 on beef and \$4.00 on mutton, and J. E. Ziegler bid \$4.98 on beef and \$4.50 on mutton. Steusloff Bros. were given the beef contract and Geo. Fendrich the mutton.
