Czar Fears Revolution.
Vienna, July 8.—A report received here through diplomatic channels from Warsaw states that the governor of that city has notified the Czar that if an outbreak against the Russian government is to be prevented, a state of siege should at once be proclaimed throughout Russian Poland. He declares that he has positive evidence that the revolutionary leaders are about ready to start an uprising, and recommends that additional troops be placed at his disposal to keep the people under control.

MILL BURNS DOWN

Big Canadian Mill Destroyed, Loss Over One Hundred Thousand

Vancouver, B. C., July 8.—The lum-
ber mills owned by the Canadian Pa-
cific Lumber Company, situated at
Port Moody, close to Vancouver, was
totally destroyed by fire early this
morning. The fire started accident-
ally from the dry kilns. The loss is
\$125,000, with insurance at about \$75,
000, all held by English companies in
Victoria, B. C.

Rains Make Country a Swamp.

St. Petersburg July 8.—Cabling
from Liao Yang, the correspondent of
the Novoe Vremya says:

"The heavy rains of the last few
days have converted the whole of
Manchuria into a swamp, which is ab-
solutely impassible. There are no
longer even wagon trains where the
roads used to be, and the movements
of the Russian and Japanese armies are
alike impeded."
