

NOTES FROM CAMP

Interesting Letter Describes Daily Duties—Oregon Has Good Quarters

Camp Nisqually, Washington, July 8, 1904.

Upon arrival in Portland we were immediately marched to the Multnomah armory where the companies were given rations for the day.

They immediately proceeded to satisfy the inner man with sandwiches and hot coffee. They were given their liberty until 9:45 to be again marched to the Union depot where we took the train for camp. One battalion of the 6 companies from Portland preceded us one hour. They were in command of Col. Gantenbein. Our section consisting of Co's B, Baker City, Cap't Sam White; D, The Dalles, Cap't Gustav Bartell; G, Albany, Cap't Chas. W. Wallace; I, Woodburn, Cap't O. G. Henderson; L, La Grande, Cap't Horace E. Coolidge; M, Salem, Cap't Chas. A. Murphy. Following us was section No. 3, under command of Major Yoran of Eugene, consisting of Co's A, B, C, and D, a separate battalion of the O. N. G.

Upon arrival at our station (after numerous delays) at 5:30 p. m., we were met by a detachment of the 10th U. S. Infantry, and were "hiked" over a dirt road for two miles to the camp site. After a wait of 2 1/2 hours we were marched to our present quarters when pitching tents was the next order of business, this occupied the time until 9:30 p. m., when the men got ready to eat, but as the stove had to be arranged and rations drawn and warmed it was 10:30 before we got anything to eat and "canned horse" and coffee tasted as well as any porthouse could have. Reville was sounded an hour later this morning on account of our lateness in getting in.

As there is no work today other than straightening up and policing quarters our men are feeling fine and are thoroughly enjoying themselves.

On our trip over the First Sergeant of Co. G. had a close call. At one station he got off the train to get some oranges and was a little late in getting back. He jumped on the steps, but missed his footing and was dragged about 50 feet when a sergeant caught his hand and hauled him aboard. Fortunately he was not hurt but he was badly scared.

Following is the daily routine governing camp:

Roll call—(police) immediately after roll call.

Mess 5:35 a. m.; Stables, 6:05 a. m.; Assembly, 6:15 a. m.; Sick, 6:20 a. m.; Water, 7:00 a. m.; Mess, 12:00 p. m.; Water and stable, 3:15 p. m.

So from this schedule you see we do not have such a hard time but it's coming.

Two companies of Idaho N. G. have just arrived in camp and the other 8 companies are expected in at any time now.

The regular troops (infantry and cavalry) of this comp held a mimic war in maneuvers today in which the

infantry were victorious.

Water for camp is provided by a regular pumping system operated by the regular troops.

The camp is an ideal one for the many maneuvers programmed as it is located on a plateau surrounded on 3 sides by timber, sandy soil covered with grass, making it fine underfoot.

A number of old Salem boys can be found in the regiment, especially in the Portland companies, such as Geo. C. L. Snyder, Bert McAtee, — Pettin-gill, Harry Fisher and others.

One of our cooks Geo. De Marenville got left in Portland and caught the next section and had to hike from the other camp to here and says we have the better camp.

Y. M. C. A. tent containing reading rooms, games, writing desks, etc., is well patronized by the members of the different organizations.

The rifle teams are still at work on some ranges about 6 miles from this camp. Sergeant White and Private Rider represent Co. M. Reports reaching here is that the regulars lead the Oregon team by one point up to last evening.

Brigadier General Funston very warmly praised the second section containing the "Farmer companies" (as Portland calls them) for maintaining such good behavior and discipline throughout our hike and on the train. This news was conveyed to our Colonel and in turn our outside companies.

R. H. Leabo is battalion adjutant of the first battalion, 3rd Oregon.

The "Blues" will be known by their blue shirts and the "Browns" by their khaki uniforms. Umpires assigned to each brigade will wear the uniform of such brigade, with white band around the left arm. They are to tell you whether you are killed or captured.

Longshoremen in Session.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 11.—The International Longshoremen, Marine and Transport Workers' Association, one of the largest and most influential labor organizations on the Great Lakes, began its thirteenth annual convention in Milwaukee today. Delegates are in attendance from all the principal lake ports. The report of Henry C. Barter shows the association to be in a flourishing condition, as regards both membership and finances. The growth during the past 12 months has been very gratifying. Since the convention held at Bay City last July, as shown by the secretary's report, more than 100 locals have been added to the association. The present convention will discuss plans for further increasing the membership, and will endeavor to establish a closer relationship with the various labor organizations of marine workmen.
