## CROPS NEED RAIN

The official weather and crop report for the week says:

During the past week the rainfall in the eastern sections of the state has been ample, and in some limited areas it has been excessive and attended by high winds and hail, which have done considerable damage to the crops lying within the tracks of these storms. In the western section of the state draught continues, and no rain of consequence has occurred since June 2d, except in some of the coast counties, and in the high level sections of southern Oregon, where local rains have fallen, and greatly improved late crops.

Fall wheat is filling nicely, and its harvest will become general this week. Fall barley is also maturing and promises to yield above the average. Early sown grain is ripening and a fair crop will be harvested. Late sown spring wheat in the Willamette valley is very poor; some of it has already been cut for hay and some will not pay to cut even for this purpose. Good rains within the next few days will help some fields of late sown spring wheat, but most of it is too far advanced to be benefited, and this part of the wheat crop, which, fortunately, comprises but a small proportion of the whole, is considered a failure. Oats are heading short and yields below the average are expected. Corn is doing fairly well. Pasturage is drying up. Stock generally keep in good condition, but there is a falling off in the flow of milk among the dairy herds. Haying is nearly finished, and the crop, although light, was secured in excellent condition.

Hops, potatoes and gardens are uneven; where rain has fallen they are doing well; where drought prevails they are from poor to good, depending upon their cultivation, and the capacity of the soil for retaining moisture.

Peaches are beginning to get ripe, and a fair crop will be picked. The cherry season is drawing to a close, and the yields were much better than expected.

## PRUNE CROP RUINED

### Yield Will Not Be Over Thirty Per cent in State

Lack of rain has severely damaged Oregon's prune crop. From every district bad yields are reported, and in places there will be no yield. It is estimated that the complete yield of Oregon will be only 30 per cent of an average crop. All of this is due to the dry season just at the time when a little rain was needed.

Other fruits are doing well, and the crop will be fair at any rate. Apples and peaches are in good condition nearly every place in the state.

Wibur K. Newell, of Dilley, Commissioner of the first district, particularly reported the effect of the dry weather upon the crops. He estimates the prune crop for his district at 1,500,000 pounds, about 30 per cent of the normal yield. Strawberries and cherries produced well. The apple crop is light, but the fruit is free from scab and is therefore of better grade than for several years past. Grapes were nipped by a frost, but, generally speaking, promise well.

A. H. Carsons, of Grant's Pass, commissioner of the third district, reported that the yield of Italian prunes would be about 20 per cent of the normal crop, but that French prunes would show about 50 per cent. The apples in his district are strictly up to grade, with a full yield. Peaches are also down for a 100 per cent yield.

Apples, peaches, cherries, plums and prunes in the fourth district, reported on by Commissioner R. H. Weber, of The Dalles, range in yield from 75 to 90 per cent of a normal crop. The small fruits are even better. This year there has been more spraying for the codlin moth, and as a consequence there will be fewer worms in the apples marketed.

In Union and adjacent counties the prune crop is fair, reported Judge Geer, of Cove, commissioner of the fifth district. Frost killed the cherries in a few localities. Pears and plums show a good crop. The strawberry crop was excellent, but lower prices than formerly prevailed. No report was made from the second district.
