

FORM LABOR UNION

Japanese Workmen Organize to Secure Higher Wages

Seattle, July 14.—Members of the local Japanese colony, aided by leaders of the Western Central Labor union, have started a movement to organize among the workmen of their race in this state one or more labor unions. The need of such an organization among the little brown men is especially felt in the railroad crews. The Japs have always worked for nearly half as much wages as Americans, but it is said that the railroads, not satisfied with this economy, are attempting to make a further cut in Japanese wages. The mikado's subjects resent it.

There are several other causes that have led up to the present attempt to organize unions of Japanese in the Puget Sound country and the rest of the state. Last winter a Japanese labor leader and editor visited this city. He is editor of a labor union paper in Japan conducted along Socialistic lines. IOWA LAWYERS MEET

Ottumwa, Ia., July 14.—About 400 Iowa lawyers were present this morning at the opening of the tenth annual meeting of the State Bar association. Rev. A. R. Craig, D. D., pronounced the invocation and William McNett delivered the address of welcome. J. C. Coog of Cedar Rapids responded. Reports were received from Secretary S. S. Wright of Tipton, Treasurer Jesse F. Stevenson of Des Moines, and from the delegates to the last convention of the American Bar association.

President George M. Wakefield of Sioux City delivered his annual address at the opening of the afternoon session. M. L. Temple of Osceola read a paper on "How Far Are Labor Unions Liable for the Acts of Their Members?" and the various committees of the association submitted their reports.

At the annual banquet this evening the following toasts will be responded to: "The Old and the New Lawyer," E. H. Stiles, Kansas City, Mo.; "The Lawyer's Fidelity to His Client," Jerry B. Sullivan, Creston; "Error Without Prejudice," A. R. Dewey, Washington; "The Lawyer in the Legislatures," D. D. Murphy, Elkader; "The Law's Responsibility for Lawlessness," T. M. Stuart, Chariton; "The Love of the Lawyer," N. E. Kendall of Albia.

The meeting will continue over tomorrow. The annual address will be delivered tomorrow morning by Luther Laflin Mills of Chicago.

AGAINST LOCAL OPTION

Albany Democrat Man Tells a Wild and Wild Snake Story

Mr. Luther King, of the soldiers' home, of Roseburg, a veteran of the Civil War, was in the city today on his way to Harris, Benton county, where he will remain with his cousin, Mrs. Lucretia Wood, for a couple of months, says the Albany Democrat. He is a nephew of ex-Sheriff Sol. King. His case is a remarkable one. On August 7, 1873, up in Idaho, he was bitten by a rattlesnake. A large quantity of whiskey taken saved his life. For 21 years he experienced nothing from the bite, but on the first of August, 1894, a rattlesnake spot appeared on his leg, grew and burst with a mass of poison, the form of a snake was seen under the flesh, winding from the toes up to the spot below the knee where he had been bitten, reaching the spot on the 7th, then gradually going away, and he was blind from the 1st to the 11th, a period of 10 days, and helpless until the first of September, during the month not eating a bite of food. Annually at the same time and in the same way this has been repeated, exactly the same, except that the rattlesnake spots have increased one each year. Last year there were nine. This year the number will be 10. The first one has appeared earlier than usual, and the snake has begun wrapping itself around the foot, which is the reason for Mr. King to hasten to his relatives for the care which they understand how to give. Already he cannot use his right leg, and has to be assisted, where he can generally walk all right. When the spots burst about two quarts of poison come out, and during the period a bite of piece of meat makes it green with poison. During the 10 days of blindness he has the convulsions peculiar to hydrophobia.
