

DA RIGATES LAND

Antic Scheme of the North- ern Country is on Foot

Toronto, Ont., July 16.—The irrigation scheme which the Canadian Pacific has now under way is undoubtedly the largest undertaking of its kind on this continent. It embraces an area extending from Calgary for 150 miles, and runs 60 miles north and south. Through the center of this tract the main line of the Canadian Pacific runs. The greater part of three years has been devoted to reconnaissance and preliminary surveys of the proposed canal scheme and the land to be served therefrom, and the result shows that about one-half, or 1,500,000 acres of the block can be irrigated at an ultimate cost of between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

A main canal 20 miles long, with a bed width of 60 feet, and carrying water a depth of 10 feet, is under construction. Some 85 miles of distributing canals have also been located, and the completion of this sector of the scheme at an estimate cost of \$1,300,000 will irrigate an area of 300,000 acres and render available a contiguous area of about 400,000 acres, for grazing and dairying.

This portion of the scheme is to be first completed and proved a success before any further extension is undertaken, but if success is obtained, then the necessary extensions will be undertaken, to finally irrigate the full amount of 1,500,000 acres, and develop the remaining 1,500,000 acres for grazing and dairying.

Interest in Irish Games.
St. Louis, Mo., July 16.—Next to the Olympic games, the sport that will be conducted both at the Stadium end and at the fair grounds during the coming week, as a feature of the national convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, promises to be the most important athletic event to be held in St. Louis during the world's fair period. Besides the track and field sports, there will be two international championships contested, hurling and football, the latter Gaelic football. In these events there will be athletes representing the Irish athletic clubs and societies of Boston, Toronto, New York, Chicago, San Francisco and a number of other cities.

Mourning for Dr. Herzl.

New York, July 16.—The memory of Dr. Theodore Herzl, the late Zionist leader, is to be honored tomorrow with memorial meeting and services held by Jews throughout America. The meeting in this city promises to be a notable affair. Addresses will be delivered by Dr. Harry Friedenwald of Baltimore, president of the Federation of American Zionists; Cyrus L. Sulzberger, vice-president; the Rev. Dr. Hertz, of Johannesburg, South Africa, and J. de Haas, the national secretary of the Zionist. As a further mark of respect to the memory of Dr. Herzl a period of mourning to last until the end of the Jewish month of Ab (August 10) has been proclaimed for all followers and sympathizers with the work of the Zionists.

Washington, D. C., July 16.—At a meeting of Red Cross reorganizers today, arrangements were discussed for carrying out the plans of John W. Foster and Richard Olney for the harmonious reorganization of the society.

WELCOME ELKS ORDER

Thousands of the Best People
on Earth Will Attend

Cincinnati, O., July 16.—While officially Elk week does not begin until Monday, official Elkdom began to come into town today for the annual grand lodge session and reunion. Grand Exalted Ruler Joseph T. Fanning and the other national officers of the order have established reunion headquarters at the Burnet house. Most of the delegations will come in tomorrow evening and Monday morning when it is expected that no less than 10,000 Elks, with accompaniments, will be in the city. Some of the large delegations for which rooms have been reserved at the leading hotels will come from Toledo, Baltimore, Detroit, Saginaw, McKeesport, Dallas, Louisville, Chicago, Columbus, New York, Parkersburg, Denver, Omaha, Kansas City, Milwaukee, and numerous other cities throughout the country.

The preparations to greet the visitors have been completed and the business section of the city is a mass of purple and white, the colors of the order. The program for the week embraces the four days' session of the grand lodge, which opens Tuesday morning, and unlimited entertainment for the members of the order, who will have an immense variety to select from, all being free to those who wear the badge of the order. Outside of the grand lodge the most interesting attaches to the contests of various orders for prizes. These include prizes for the delegations coming the longest distances, for parade appearance and originality, for the largest percentage of total membership attending the reunion, and for drill contests and band contests, for both of which there are numerous entries.

The complete programme for the week is as follows:

Monday—Boat excursion on Ohio river for grand lodge members and their families. Fire works display on banks of the river by Cincinnati lodge and neighboring lodges.

Tuesday—Opening of the grand lodge session in Masonic hall at 10:00 a. m. Addresses by Myron T. Herrick, governor of Ohio; Julius Fleischmann, mayor of Cincinnati; August Herman, exalted ruler of Cincinnati lodge, and Joseph T. Fanning, of Indianapolis, grand exalted ruler. Musical exercises with orchestra organ and chorus of 200 voices. Grand lodge will convene in regular session at 2 p. m., when the annual election of grand lodge officers will be held. Preliminary band contest at ball park at 10 a. m. Final band contest at ball park at 5 p. m.

Wednesday—Annual parade of the order at 10 a. m. Family picnic in Eden park, with band concert, day-light fireworks and visits to art museum, art school and Rookwood pottery. Evening—Grand ball tendered to visitors by Synina Temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

Thursday—Trip to Fort Thomas to witness guard mount and dress parade, 8 a. m. Barbecue and burgoon at Oakley race track, from 1 to 6 o'clock. The afternoon will be given over to band concerts, field sports of all kinds a sham battle by the Ohio national guard.

Friday Visits to places of interest in and about Cincinnati.

William J. O'Brien, Jr. of Baltimore, and Samuel Neads, of Cleveland, are rival candidates for the position of grand exalted ruler, to succeed Mr. Fanning. For the next place of meeting, Buffalo, Syracuse, Dallas and one or two other cities are aspirants.

American Bowlers Entered.

Berlin, July 16.—Additional interest is given to the great national bowling tournament which opened today at Soligen by reason of the participation of a team representing the American United Bowling clubs. The tournament is the largest affair of its kind ever held. The total number of participants exceeds 3,000 and includes all the crack bowlers of Germany. The competitions will extend over two weeks. For the purposes of the tournament a new festival hall containing 30 bowling alleys has been expressly built. A large number of valuable prizes will crown the success of the winners, the chief one being a handsome trophy offered by the Kaiser.

New Pitless Plum.

The Oregon Nursery Company has purchased from Luther Burbanks, the California wizard, his miracle pitless plum, paying the grower \$2500 for the tree. They will place it on the market in a few years, and expect to realize handsomely from it. The plum is similar to the Blue Damsion in size and flavor, and, while it has a small seed, it is entirely free from a pit. Burbank devotes his entire time to developing fruit of this nature, and has accomplished some wonderful results.
