A COWARDLY PLATFORM.

The Democratic platform very appropriately bears the impress of the tricksters and dodgers who framed it. As originally prepared it had a plank which said: "The discoveries of gold within the past few years and the great increase in the production of, adding 2,000,000,000 to the world's supply, of which \$700,000,000 falls to the share of the United States, has contributed to the maintenance of a money standard of value no longer open to question, removing that issue from the field of practical contention."

Bryan, although a large majority of the committee was against him at the start, bulldozed that body into killing that plank, and the platform will go before the people without expression whatever on the finance question. All the New Yorkers, the Murphy men as well as the Hill men, came to the convention resolved to insert a gold plank in the platform, and most of the rest of the eastern section of their party stood with them, but the opposition in the west and south was so powerful that, rather than have another fight on this issue on the floor of the convention, they dodged it altogether, with the hope of fooling the silver men and the gold men among the voters. In many respects the platform is equally dishonest.

"We favor a wise, conservative and business-like revision and a gradual reduction of the tariff for the friends of the masses and for the common weal and not by the friends of its abuses, its extortions and its discriminations."

The Democratic majority in congress framed this sort of a tariff in 1894, which the Democratic President called the "party perdy and party dishonor" tariff, and which he refused to sign, letting it go on the statute book on the expiration of the ten-day time limit. That tariff failed to produce either revenue for the government or protection for the producer. The fear of the framing of just such a tariff, which the people began to feel just as soon as the news of the Democratic victory in 1892 came in precipitated the panic of 1902. This panic and this tariff were among the things which incited that popular revolution which threw the Democracy out of control of congress in the election of 1894 and expelled it from the Presidency in 1896. Had the platform framers in St. Louis mentioned this piece of recent history they would have thrown a little

side light on their purposes at the present time and have shown the people just what to expect if the Democratic demand for a "wise, conservative and business-like revision and reduction of the tariff" should chance to be indorsed at the polls.

In St. Louis and in 1904 the Democratic party demands the "extermination of polygamy within the jurisdiction of the United States." When there was real polygamy in this country which was a menace to the people of its region, and when the Republican party was fighting it, the Democracy had nothing to say about it. This is something also which the platform framers neglected to mention. The platform says the Democracy has been wanting an Isthmian canal for a long time, but it forgot to add that when the only chance for the construction of a canal was offered the Democratic leaders in the senate and a large part of the Democratic membership opposed the canal treaty, and thus tried to defeat the project. While claiming some of the credit for the national irrigation idea act of 1902 the platform makers carefully refrained from confessing that it was a Republican President who started the irrigation idea in its practical phase and it was a Republican congress which enacted it. The platform framers appeal for the "protection of our citizens at home and abroad," while their party ostentatiously deprives many millions of citizens in the southern states of the rights guaranteed them by the law. The platform threat of a war against the trusts has a hollow sound in view of the circumstances that the friendship of the trusts for Parker and the promise of Wall street to make a contribution to the Democratic campaign fund if he were nominated were the leading factors which won him the favor of the Democratic bosses and placed him ahead of all rivals for the candidacy. For evasion, shuffling, effrontery and cowardice the St. Louis platform of 1904, will hold a unique place among Democratic national deliverances.

Magnificent Menagerie with the Great Floto Shows.

Scarcely any idea of the great cardinal principle of progress in animal life evolution may be had without a knowledge of wild animals. The wise men of the world know this fact, and in order to make such knowledge available, as well as to entertain and amuse, have established in the larger cities of the world enormous expensive institutions and only the wealthiest communities can afford them.

It is because these great shows make one of the many features of their exhibitions a menagerie that is complete in every particular that they are of incalculable practical benefit to any and every community they visit. Years of study of zoology in books is not so effective as an hour spent in this menagerie. And when during this hour one may be amused by the antics of the monkeys, marvel at the strange creatures of odd shapes and savage disposition, and at the same time be entertained by the music of a magnificent military band, an hour of diversion and study is supplied that can be had nowhere else.

It is for this reason that the doors of the shows are opened an hour before the beginning of the arene performance. It is really a duty to get to the shows early enough to allow the children ample time to see all the animals, and an hour is none too long for a hasty inspection of them all. Shows will exhibit in Salem on July 27, afternoon and evening.

Crack Hurdlers Try for Records.

New York, July 18.—An interesting event to be held at the athletic meet today, at the opening of Palham Bay park, is the 440 yard hurdle race, handicap. The stars in this race are Harry Hillman, the crack hurdler of the New York Athletic club, who holds the metropolitan championship for the 220 yard hurdle race and former national champion, and W. Castlemann, captain of the Colgate university track team, who represented the Greater New York Irish A. A., in the world's fair championships, and won the 120 yard high hurdle race. With these two among the contestants it is not impossible that the race may result in establishing a new world's record.

Caught a Big Fish.

The Albany Herald relates the following:

State Treasurer Charles A. Moore and Dr. L. F. Griffith, of Salem, spent the past few days on the Elkhorn near Gates, where they enjoyed fishing for the festive speckled trout. Wonderful stories of their prowess are coming out of the mountains, and as they are told by gentlemen of the strictest integrity they will no doubt be believed. It is stated of Mr. Moore, who has fished for trout in every part of the state, and whose experience in this line is second to none in Oregon, that he landed a fine speckled beauty on Friday evening that put the "oldest inhabitant" to wondering for the fish weighed fully 16 1/2 pounds—no, not pounds, but ounces—16 1/2 ounces, and was as fine a specimen of the speckled trout as was ever seen in the Cascade mountains, and Mr. Moore is justly proud of his catch. The trout was promptly dismembered and eaten for supper, and while the luscious morsel was being discussed, stories of the prowess of other fishermen were being detailed by the crowd around the camp fire. Dr. Griffith, who is something of a fisherman himself, declared that he proposed to remain in the mountains until he could at least equal the catch of Mr. Moore, and it is likely that his position as first physician at the insane asylum will be vacant for a few days while he is making good his threat.

The Parkersville drainage case was decided by Judge Scott in favor of the petitioners and S. W. Jones, F. J. Bolter and L. D. Kelly appointed as trustees to carry out the instructions of the court. The district will embrace about 600 acres of fine land at the head of Lake Labish, and when drained will be very valuable.

Cannery Through Run.

The Salem cannery closed down Saturday night after completing the run on berries and cherries. The next product will be corn, and after that pears and apples. The cannery, under the management of Mr. Holcomb, is a great success, and is the means of placing a large sum of money in the growers' hands.

Prune Association Met.

The stockholders of the Willamette Valley Prune Association met Saturday afternoon, and adjourned to meet on August 13th for the transaction of their yearly business. The directors did not finish the work of the year, and the adjournment was made in order to give them time to finish the work.

Columbia Logger's Wages. The Columbia river loggers are about to fix the following schedule of wages: Hook tender, \$4; railroad engineer, \$3; head train loader, \$2.75; first faller, \$2.75; second faller, \$2.50; buckers, \$2.50; rigging rustler, \$2.50; chaser, \$2.25; swamper, \$2.25; sniper, \$2.25; signal boy, \$1.25; donkey engineer, \$1.75; fireman, \$2; rollway man, \$2.50; section foreman, \$2.25; section men and common laborers, \$1.75; blacksmiths, \$3; blacksmith helpers, \$2.20; boom man, \$2.50; flier, \$2.75. The proposed cut will reduce wages all the way from 25 to 75 cents per day. The men are charged at the rate of 60 cents per day for board at the mess-houses, and are provided with bunks free of charge.

Chittim Bark Sold. About a week ago there was enacted in this city a transaction whereby H. Friendly became the owner of famous chittim or cascara bark. The bark was brought in by a Mahon and the fact that 50 tons was soon change hands will make people open their eyes in amazement. Lane county has always had a reputation of enacting big things within its borders and the transaction occurring a few days ago is by far the largest deal in chittim bark ever consummated in the State of Oregon. Five and five and a half cents now being paid for the bark.—Eugene Guard.
