SOME REPAIRS ORDERED

School Board Will Fix Up Buildings and Put in Sewer

At a regular meeting of the school board Saturday evening at the office of O. A. Condit some improvements on the buildings were ordered. The tin roofs on all the different buildings were ordered placed in good repair. A septic sewer was ordered placed on the grounds of the North school. At the East building the rooms will all be kalsomined, and the balance of the basement will be cemented. At the Park school no repairs were considered necessary, while at the Lincoln school the halls will be finished and the entire basement will be cemented. A committee composed of Messrs. Fletcher and Lee will have charge of the North Salem sewer improvement and will make investigations next Wednesday evening. The committee on repairs simply reported in favor of cement strips in the Park school and no more cementing in the East school, but upon investigation it was found that there would be sufficient funds to justify the expenditure, and upon motion it was ordered. All told from \$1500 to \$2000 will be expended on these repairs.

A communication was received from the city authorities asking that the city authorities be given jurisdiction over the unused sewer running from the East building to Court street on Thirteenth street. It seems that after the Marion street sewer was built the school district abandoned the sewer leading to Court street and connected with the Marion street sewer, thus leaving the former unused. The matter was referred to Director Condit for adjustment with the city.

The resignation of Miss Anna M. Gordon was accepted, but no successor was elected to fill her place.

The clerk was directed to communicate with the city council, asking for permission to use the police court room in the city hall for meetings of the board.

EASTERN OREGON TRAIL

John Minto of This City Will Take a Trip to the End of C. & E. Road

Hon. John Minto, of Salem, one of the most experienced pioneers living in the state, and who, for 60 years, has been tireless in promoting Oregon interests and in helping to develop the resources of the Willamette valley, is planning to go into the Cascade mountains in a few days, where he will instruct a class of young men in forestry, and, incidentally, in the work of building a trail from the end of the railroad through Minto Pass to Crook county, says the Albany Herald.

This is one of Mr. Minto's hobbies, and a good one it is. He believes that the trade of Central Eastern Oregon could and should be brought across the mountains to the Willamette valley, and that his can best be done through the pass that bears his name. For years he has been advocating the construction of a trail—many years ago he helped cut one through the forest of the Cascade range at the same place—and he will now spy out the land once more, and see if the trail, which he hopes to see grow into a well traveled road cannot be cut this year, and, though over 83 years old, this active pioneer will undertake the labor and hardships of a summer's stay in the mountains to bring about his cherished project, and see it become a fact.

Mr. Minto will be accompanied by quite a party on his trip to the mountains, and he will be supported in his work by Manager Edwin Stone, of the C. & E. railroad, who is very much impressed with the old pioneer's plan, and thinks it will result in the opening of a valuable highway of traffic.

The summer school of forestry, as advocated by Mr. Minto, and which he proposes to conduct, is another of that gentleman's pet theories, and he will give a party of young men practical instruction in forestry in the natural timber of the Cascade range. His long experience in Oregon, and especially in the mountains and forests of the Western part of the state, make him an excellent instructor in that line, and he will inculcate valuable lessons, and will sow a seed that will be of vast benefit to the future of the state.

Captured an Eagle.

While William Beasley was out deer hunting yesterday afternoon he took a shot at an eagle and it fell to the ground evidently dead, but it was found that it had been struck on the wing and was more stunned than hurt so it was made fast and brought back to the city. It is a beautiful specimen of the gray species and measures eight feet from tip to tip. Beasley finds that it is really a white elephant on his hands, but does not want to kill it.—Astoria Budget.
