MOON SHOWS WELL

Interesting Facts Brought to Light by Photos and Sketches

By lantern slides features of the moon are clearly presented, and, with the moon brought to an apparent distance of only 60 miles, its scenery actually lays spread out before us. Not only may the most accurate maps of its surface be prepared, but particular features everywhere identified. Owing to the small size of the moon, the horizon would be much nearer than upon the earth, and the field of view consequently much contracted. Within that some things would be missed to which we are accustomed on our sphere; there would be no blue sky, because of absence of atmosphere; the heavens would not be black, but always perfectly clear and studded thickly and brilliantly with stars, because of the lack of moisture from which clouds could be formed; oceans, lakes, streams and even dewdrops would be absolutely wanting; for there is no water on the moon. Neither do those features of scenery exist which are due to life; for there are no trees, plants, flowers, grass, or even moss; there are no living beings in a world which could provide them no support, and, of course, there is not a "man in the moon." All is a vast, uninhabitable and unaltered desert.

Among the features conspicuous in the scenery are the vast plains, hundreds of miles in width, which used to be thought to be oceans or old ocean beds. The one known as Mare Crisium, the dark spot near the upper right edge of the moon, can easily be detected with the naked eye. Here and there the surface of the globe is strangely rent with great chasms or 'anyons, one of which runs almost straight across the country for 60 miles, and even cleaves the walls of craters. This one varies in width from one-eighth to one mile. Such chasms are known to be eight miles deep. In the neighborhood of Triesnecker some such canyons measure 300 miles in length, and cross one another at certain junction points.

Mountains are seen almost everywhere on the moon, 40 peaks exceeding that of Mount Blanc in height. Pico rises abruptly from the plain 8000 feet. The lunar Apennines rise gradually, breaking off in fearful precipices, and attain an elevation of more than 17,000 feet. The Leibnitz mountains run 30,000 to 36,000 feet in height, much more lofty than anything known on earth. The forms of the mountains can often be determined by their dark shadow cast upon the plains. While there is no water now apparent upon the moon, there are counted as many as 35 lunar rivers or possible old river beds. These often had their origin in lakes, whence they meandered into the desert and wasted away.
