

## BICYCLE THIEF UNEASY

### Made an Attempt to Break Jail by Sawing Way Out

Yesterday another attempt was made by inmates to saw their way out of the county jail. This kind of news is not surprising these days, as everybody knows that Marion county's repository for criminals is anything but safe. About noon Miss Dean Witzell, deputy county recorder, noticed that something unusual was going on at one of the north windows of the jail, and Sheriff Culver's attention was called to it. Upon examination it appeared that one Kryson, who is serving a 30-day sentence for stealing a bicycle, was doing some smooth work in the way of sawing off one of the iron bars of the window. It was soon found by the officers that the man had made a saw of an old clock spring, about 10 inches in length, with which he had sawed one of the bars two-thirds off. He afterwards admitted that the work had been done in five minutes, and that had he not been disturbed it would have been only a matter of a short time until sufficient bars were cut to let all pass out in the early hours of the night. The prisoner claims that he found the spring and a piece of an old file in some waste paper in the jail, but this story is not believed. He is evidently a good mechanic to be able to have made so good a saw from the scrap of steel, and it is probable that he cut his first piece of work at the time. It is also thought by Sheriff Culver that Harry Dunn, the window smasher, was a silent partner in the act, and both have since been kept in their cells.

It is no secret that our county jail is out of date, and that it is unsanitary, and that it is not "burglar proof." Sheriff Culver says he shall expect to guard any prisoners of importance in the future. There other defects about the old court house that ought to have attention, and it is no doubt the expectation of the county court to regulate them all at some future period. The roof is in bad shape, and in the rainy season there are no less than 20 old pans and pails setting about the attic to catch the streams of water that leak in. As a result of this condition it is admitted that many of the inmates in the upper part must be pelted out. These things should be properly repaired, the building should be given steam heating apparatus, and modernized in many ways. The vault room is insufficient, and most of the officers should have consulting rooms. No doubt all these things will some day be undertaken by the county court, and at the same time provision will be made for steel cells, or some other proper contrivance for the safe keeping of prisoners.

## MILITIA BOYS HOME

### Arrive on a Special Train After Midnight

Company M Third regiment, Oregon National Guard arrived home last night from their 12 days' encampment at American Lake, Washington. The trip was made without incident, but the boys were tired and weary from the many arduous duties of the past two weeks and it will require a day or two for them to get accustomed to the monotony of every-day life.

The camp was entirely different from any ever held on the Coast before and lacked all the features of an outing. The work was hard and many a poor rookie longed for home and a soft mattress, before the tents were pitched for the final ending of the camp. But there was very little "beefing" and veteran and recruit alike took his medicine without a murmur. The rations were scant at times, but the camp officers remedied the defects as fast as they were apparent, and worked hard to supply the men with good, wholesome food.

Captain Murphy, in discussing the encampment today, said: "I believe this was the greatest peace meeting of soldiers ever held west of the Rock Mountains. There was very little sickness, accounted for probably by the fine water and healthy surroundings of the camp. Private Lewis Judson was the only sick man that we had while we were in camp, and he is not serious. We never had a man in the hospital, and the rations were good, in spite of the reports to the contrary. We had the largest company at drill of any in the Oregon brigade, but one company had a larger muster roll than the Salem company. I believe that the hooch is lifted from the local militia company, and we will have the crack company of the guard within a short time."

The boys have a healthy color, and do not bear the evidences of any great exertion during the 12 days, although it is certain they traveled over the ground at times. The members are very enthusiastic in the praise of the camp, and the treatment received by their company officers.
