## LEAVES INDIAN SCHOOL

### Superintendent Potter Tenders His Resignation to Department

Superintendent T. W. Potter, of the Chemawa Indian school, has tendered his resignation, to take effect when his successor is appointed, and in the future will devote his time to looking after his private business interests in Washington and Oklahoma.

The people of Salem and the patrons of the Indian school appreciate the splendid work accomplished for the school during the past nine years by Mr. Potter, and they are sorry to lose him, not only as superintendent of the school, but as a citizen.

He has been engaged in the work among the Indians for the past 18 years, and is considered one of the best men in the service. Owing to some trouble with the department a few months ago, an investigation was ordered, but the inspectors' report fully vindicated the action of Mr. Potter in every respect, and his resignation is not in any way connected with that episode.

Early last spring Mr. Potter concluded to tender his resignation, on account of the press of private business, occasioned by the serious illness of his partner in Washington, but about the time the letter was prepared and ready to be sent to the department, the investigation was ordered, and he could not well quit the service in disgrace, all owing to the matter coming up at that time.

The school, under his care, has increased wonderfully, and today is one of the best in the United States, if not at the top rank.

Mr. Potter, in an interview with The Journal this morning, said that he was sorry to leave Salem and the school, as his whole heart was in the institution, but it was absolutely necessary for him to do so, in order to protect his private interests.

A number of prominent citizens were seen today, and it is not believed that a local option movement will be begun in this city or against the city. It is believed that the local option leaders will look at the matter from this point of view under their theory of fighting liquor, and leave Baker City in her present condition until some future time when sentiment may change.

## RATES RUNNING HIGH

San Francisco, July 21.—War risks on merchant vessels of all nations bound for Japanese ports advanced all along the line this morning as a result of the reports that the Vladivostok squadron has started on another raid. The local agencies, while admitting a decided advance, refuse to give the figures. The insurance men and agent and owners of vessels operating between this port and Japanese ports, while affecting optimistic air, are plainly ill at ease. They claim that even if their vessels are captured they cannot be held as contrabands of war are not carried.

Esopus, July 21.—John B. McDonald's yacht "Sapphire" sailed for New York with the owner, Mr. Belmont and Justice Morgan. Judge Parker and brother dined aboard last night. When Parker went down to the dock for his plunge early this morning the crew of the Sapphire were just hauling up the anchor. McDonald and O'Brien thrust their heads out of the cabin windows and called a lusty greeting, and were chided by the nominee for oversleeping. Parker was still splashing about as the vessel sailed away. The judge took his usual horseback ride this morning, accompanied by his daughter.

### Gamblers Run Town.

Bonesteel, S. D., July 21.—For 24 hours in the hands of grafters the town authorities capitulated upon the terms of the lawless element. The police have been detained to protect the gamblers doing business. A gang of grafters assaulted the policemen, took away their clubs and stars. The appeal for troops failed, and to prevent bloodshed Mayor Erb gave in.
