RURAL MAIL ROUTES

Inspector Clement Will Look Over Marion County

E. C. Clement, inspector of rural free delivery routes in the city, and will look over several routes with a view of making minor changes.

The rural routes today are the most popular branch of the government postal service, and have increased to over 22,000, although the idea is practically a new one. The state of Oregon is well supplied with routes, and many applications are on file for additional ones.

Mr. Clement says that the branch of the service is becoming self-sustaining. In spite of the heavy outlay of money to inaugurate it. One instance cited by him shows the benefits of the system. The postoffice at Argenti, in this county, has cost the government over \$800 a year to deliver the mail by the stage and the business of the postoffice was about \$2 per month, the postmaster receiving that for his trouble. Now the government will establish a rural route on the same ground, the driver will receive \$720, and the postoffice will be discontinued, thus saving the government upwards of \$100 a year, and giving the people a much better service. The town of Argenti consisted of one house, and the patrons of the office were located at distances of from a quarter of a mile to five miles away. Every time they received their mail it meant a trip to the office, and then the stage route was slow in getting it to them. Now the mail will be delivered at their doors every day at a less charge, and every patron will be enabled to read the daily papers.

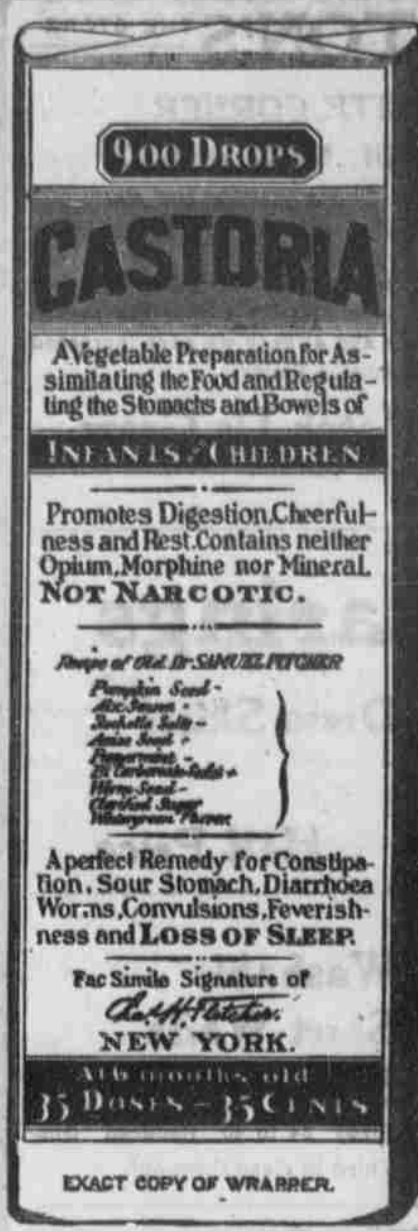
