## ANOTHER ELECTRIC COMPANY

### Headed for This Great Transportation Center

#### Line From Portland to Eugene Via Salem to Be Built in Five Months

Portland, July 23.—The Mt. Hood Electric Company, has announced that it will construct an electric car line from this city to Eugene. The road will be completed to Salem, it is expected within five months, as the right of way and track privileges have been secured.

They are building a plant about 30 miles southeast of Portland, near Bull Run Postoffice, and the power will be secured from the Sandy river.

The river has a heavy fall, averaging 60 feet to the mile, and carries a large volume of water for year around.

The force of workmen now employed are building a canal and a flume a distance of seven miles.

(The dispatches from Portland gives what purports to be the details of the new electric car line between Portland and this city. Inquiry at the office of F. T. Wrightman, state corporation clerk, fails to disclose a company bearing the name as stated in the dispatch. The Hood River Electric and Power Company is on record with a capital of \$50,000, but whether it is the same company is not known.)

## WORKMEN WILL NOT CHANGE

### Oregon Members Vote to Stay With Present Plan

Portland, July 23.—After a stormy debate, lasting for more than three days the grand lodge of Oregon A. O. U. W. settled the much-mooted question of changing the assessment rate by voting down the so-called "new plan," advocated by the supreme lodge, and adopted by many of the states of the Union. The vote was close, and the champions of the change died hard, but when it was finally settled the best of feeling prevailed, and everybody shook hands and "made up." The "new plan" provided for a sinking fund, and a slight increase in the rate at which members over 55 years are assessed. The contest was virtually a test of strength between the old and the young members, as the gray-beards, for the greater part, resisted the change.

Friday morning session began at 9 o'clock, and after rollcall a resolution was passed directing the grand master to request all of the lodges in the jurisdiction outside of Portland to contribute 25 cents per annum for each 100 members to the relief fund, which in the past has been maintained exclusively by the lodges in the city. At 10 o'clock the rate question was taken up and discussed until noon.

After reassembling, at 1:30 o'clock, a communication was read from Oregon council No. 1582, Royal Arcanum, conveying fraternal greetings to the grand lodge. The communication was received amid applause, and the grand recorder was instructed to reply in like vein.

The assessment plan was again considered at length, Chairman Colvig, of the committee on jurisprudence, making the closing argument. A vote was then taken, with the result that the proposed change was beaten by a small majority.

The report of the grand master was then read and adopted. It shows that six new lodges were organized during the past year as follows: Oregon No. 139, at Cottage Grove; Crystal Springs No. 140, Willamette; Summit, No. 141, Boring; North Bend, No. 80, North Bend; Bunch Grass, No. 56, Condon, and Perry Canyon, No. 134, Allville.

### Anti Semitic Rioters in Prussia Destroy Grave Yards

Berlin, July 23.—Anti-semitic riots occurred today at Bracht, Prussia, where they excavated a Jewish cemetery and disinterred many corpses, pitching them into the street. The rioters attacked the synagogue destroying the fittings.

## RUSSIANS GETTING RESTLESS

### Angry Mob Makes Anti War Demonstration in Warsaw

Berlin, July 23.—The Vossische Zeitung states that the anti-war demonstrations on the streets of Warsaw continue, with constant fighting between the mob and police. The Koszaks were in a fight today in which 16 persons were killed and 30 wounded. More than 100 arrests were made.

#### Gorman is Firm.

Washington, June 23.—Senator Gorman was in the city today, and his attention was called to a statement purporting to have been made by a member of the Democratic national committee, to the effect that he might consent to accept the chairmanship. Mr. Gorman stated he had frankly informed all who had made such suggestion that it would be impossible for him to undertake the labors incident to that position, and that he now desired to add that no conditions will induce him to change that determination. He will, however, be said, be very glad to render all the service in his power to those who may be selected to take charge of the campaign, which he hopes will be crowned with success.

#### Colombia in Good Humor.

Washington, July 23.—Colombia is to again come into full diplomatic relation with the United States, and the Panama matter will be a closed incident between the two governments. The state department today received a consular letter from the Colombian minister of foreign affairs, announcing that Dr. Thomas Herran had been given full letters of credentials as Colombia's envoy at Washington.

#### Body Carried for Miles.

Fossil, Or., July 23.—The body of Mrs. Bethune, the aged woman who was drowned in the flood that swept the town of Mitchell, was found on the 15th inst. on a gravel bar of the John Day river a few miles below Clarno's ferry. The body was badly disfigured and decomposed, and was buried where found by the settlers of that neighborhood.

The body of Martin Smith, the other aged victim of the flood, has not yet been found. Mrs. Bethune's body was carried about 45 miles by the water.
