LIGHT AND DARK, SALEM BOY ON THE SEA



Writes of His Trip and Relates Many Interesting Episodes

Clyde Mason, writes to his parents in this city from Newcastle, New South Wales. He is on the sailing vessel Reaper and is having considerable experience. His letter is as follows: Although the last trip didn't have the novelty of the first one it did have a novelty of its own. Our Jap cook deserted in Africa and after considerable difficulty during the intervals of which I was cook for the whole sixteen we shipped a lean, long, lank Dane that said he could cook and make bread.

The next day we sailed and the facts began to develop. His cooking wasn't exactly up to the standard of American ships and he could not make bread, then he became sick and I resumed operations in conjunction with one of the sailors, a Frenchman. But still there was no bread so we ate hard bread. As the mate has only one tooth and that is right in front he cursed; the old man loosened his crown work and it fell out so he cursed, and as the crew was accustomed to soft bread they cursed, in fact we had a delightful time.

Then there was one day when I was helping the poor Dane in the galley. We had been having fair wind and very little rolling though we were in ballast and things in the galley were standing and laying around rather carelessly. Then the wind changed and with the change came a heavy swell. But the wind was dead aft and the swell was right abeam so that she began to roll rather fiercely and then there was things doing.

The long way of the galley lies across the vessel and when she began to roll, things began to move. First to one side and down came a bunch of pans; back with a jerk and over goes a slop bucket or kettle of soup. Then picture if you can the sick Dane sitting in the doorway (the sills are knee high) with his feet braced against a locker and myself trying to stand on the now thoroughly greased linoleum floor and at the same time trying to catch everything possible.

Down to one wall ker—bang—in a mess of pots, pans, and kettles! ker—swish back to the other wall (some 15 feet) with the same mess and a few more. But of course this rolling is in spurts and we soon had everything hung up on a hook where it could swing or made fast so that it could not.

All things have an end so now we have a real live cook, a genuine Uncle Tom's cabin. Newcastle is one of the greatest coaling depots in the world and is naturally rather grimy. Many of the shafts are sunk right here in the city and some of the levels extend as far as thirteen miles out under the ocean.

The coal is loaded on special cars holding about 8 or 9 tons each. The cars are so built that the car sets on the truck. The trucks run along immediately back of the coal wharfs along which are numerous large hydraulic cranes. The cranes lift a car off its trucks, and swing it out over the ship's hatch, and a man there presses the button and the bottom drops out of the car.

The cranes lift a car off its truck, the next one is shunted up and the process repeated. But Sydney is the place. With the climate of Los Angeles and one of the finest harbors in the world has been combined a beautiful city and the result certainly looks good to me.

The harbor, called Port Jackson, is made up of deep water bays and inlets and is studded with islands, thus giving plenty of good anchorage and shelter from all wind. And the points, islands and headlands are either military reserves bristling with artillery or public parks speckled with statuary.

There are many lively suburbs, many fine business and public buildings, some magnificent cathedrals and colleges, excellent ferry and tram (street car) services and although the streets seem to have been thrown together very much like some of our own cities the streets themselves are well paved and well kept.

From here we go direct to San Francisco and as the average passage is somewhere between 70 and 100 days and we expect to clear shortly after the first of July we also expect to arrive in Frisco during September or the early part of October.
