Strong walls cannot control crime until brick and mortar can control thought.

And thought is free as the air. It slips past the guard, it passes through the keyhole, it scorns the grating, it laughs at walls of stone, it knows not the terror of the gallows.

Prisons cannot save us, the scaffold cannot free us, the laws cannot protect us from crime.

Ah, but the laws are weak, you are strong.

When the walls of the prison are fragile you are powerful.

While the hangman's rope cannot choke the life from crime, you can.

When the desire for the possession of what belongs to another comes to you, turn it out. Don't wish for what is not your own. Resolve to earn what you have. Thus a different brain track is made, and this track deepened will lead to prosperity, never to theft.

Instead of wishing to rid yourself of one who is hateful, wish yourself higher and better than he. A MAN AND HIS WATCH.

It is the steady going sort of worker who gets most done in the end. It is with men as it is with watches—the most reliable and serviceable are the ones that are steadily at work.

There is a Pennsylvania engineer

who was retired on a pension after 48 years of service.

"I have carried one watch for more than 26 years," he says, "and it always kept the right time.

Needless to say he has been a sober, orderly man. For 40 years he has not touched a drop of liquor. He never even smoked or chewed. His health has always been good.

The fact that this man has been able to carry one watch so many years is not surprising, although his "life" has been much longer than that of the average timepiece. All watch-makers say that a watch partakes of the traits of the one who carries it. If the owner is steady, even-tempered and reliable and never flies off the handle, his watch behaves itself in the most proper manner. If the owner is a genius, with an erratic, excitable, uncertain temperament, the watch cuts up all sorts of pranks and is too fast or too slow or else will not run at all.

Watch repairers look with considerable suspicion on men whose watch always needs regulating. The man whose watch is always right, "just to the tick," is sure to be one who keeps regular hours, does not eat or drink to excess, conducts everything in a methodical manner and consequently enjoys good health.

Men who partake of wine suppers, eat Welsh rabbits and stand off their tails are always complaining that their watches do not keep good time.

Running regularly lasts the longest. The watch, or the man, that is kept running regularly lasts the longest and is of the best service while it lasts. The stingy old miser who stops his clock every night so it won't be wearing out while he sleeps gains nothing for his trouble.

This old engineer's watch has kept good time for 26 years for the reason that the man himself has kept his habits correct all the time. Had he ever gone out, just once, on a high old time and wound up by pawing his watch next morning, we never should have heard of his wonderful time-piece, for no watch was ever known to keep good time after being subjected to such humiliation.

The retired engineer is old in years but young in spirits. He has kept himself as he kept his watch. He enjoys the admiration and gratitude of all the officials over him, for the reason that, wherever the run assigned him, he made it on time and had no worries left over.

The watch that works only by fits and starts is never to be trusted. Nor is the man who does his work only in the same way ever capable of the highest achievements possible to his station.

SUNDAY CLOSING FARCE.

St. Louis is a wide-open city—wide open on Sunday after the German rather than the American fashion. No whiskey is sold in the saloons, or at any rate the front doors of the saloons are all closed.

But the beer gardens are all open, and in the neighborhood of the exposition there are two immense beer gardens which, combined, can entertain from thirty to forty thousand persons between midnight and noon on Sunday. Right next to the largest and most popular of these gardens there is a race track, with races on most Sundays during the exposition season; and in the open country about the exposition grounds there are scores of resorts and attractions which would not be tolerated on the "Pike." All the baseball grounds on the outer edge of the city are open on Sunday; so are all the billiard rooms in every part of the city.

In the city itself three or four theaters have two performances a day, and down at the levee there are dozens of excursion boats waiting in for Sunday crowds which seek a cool river breeze, combined with opportunities for gambling with professionals of the lowest and most dangerous type. On Sundays all these places are in full blast; while the beautiful grounds at Forest park are tightly closed to the public by a high fence.

Even if the exposition buildings are to be closed, this policy of excluding people from the terraces, the plazas, the lawns, and the groves of Forest park, and from the art galleries, carries with it no saving of Sunday labor. Street car traffic to the Sunday attractions is as heavy as it is on week days. It is even heavier, for St. Louis working-class population is at liberty on Sunday, and like the visitor from a distance, it is drawn to any attraction which is offered.

There is even no saving of work for the restaurant waiters, for visitors must get their meals somewhere. The exposition management is keeping loyalty to the agreement with congress as to Sunday closing—no loyalty in fact, that on Sundays a fence is built about the hotel within the grounds to keep the 3000 visitors and the 1200 help from straggling onto the boulevards and avenues of the exposition.

But it can scarcely be claimed that

the closing movement has been wholly successful as regards the right keeping of Sunday. We suppose that it is now too late to correct the error; it could be corrected, we judge, only by act of congress; but that it is an error from every point of view appears to us almost self-evident, and the fact is worth noting now in order that the country may be saved from similar errors in the future.

To shut up by law innocent, educative and helpful places of recreation on Sunday, and leave doubtful, degrading and positively vicious ones in full operation, and to do this in the name of religion, is to inflict another of those wounds from which religion has so often suffered at the hands of its friends.—Outlook.

RIVER SWIMMING.

Drowning and narrow escapes are reported throughout the country at this time of year. People should be careful when they go into the water and not stay until they are exhausted. A bad feature of river bathing is to take a plunge when overheated and the sudden change of temperature brings on cramps. Good swimmers are not free from this affection, in fact they are the ones usually caught. Poor swimmers never take any chances, therefore are scarcely ever in danger.

SOIL AND CLIMATE WIN.

The first new wheat to be reported in the valley was delivered at Albany on Friday evening. The millmen say that it is of a good quality and the yield was above the expectation of the grower. Oregon never has a crop failure and when the croakers are busy declaiming the country, the excellent soil and climate get in their work, and the result is bounteous productions of all kinds.

To Succeed Schwab.

New York, July 26.—It is understood that Thomas Morrison of Pittsburgh will be chosen to succeed Charles M. Schwab as a director of the United States Steel corporation at the meeting of the directors today. There has been much speculation as to the successor of the former president of the Steel corporation, who is now to end his connection with it as a director. Names of various men have been mentioned, including those of W. P. Snyder and W. Mellon, but it is understood that after conferences between Messrs. Morgan, Frick, Corey and big men in the corporation the choice has fallen on Mr. Morrison.

While comparatively unknown to Wall street men and the banking element in the Steel corporation, Mr. Morrison is a practical steel manufacturer and once was superintendent and general manager of one of the plants of the old Carnegie company. He has the reputation of being one of the brightest of the coterie of Carnegie young men when Carnegie and Frick operated the great Carnegie works a few years ago. Mr. Morrison is a large stock holder in the United States Steel corporation. Within the last few years he has not been in active business.

Fixing Cotton Goods Prices.

Greenville, S. C., July 26.—The cotton manufacturers of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama met here today to definitely settle what the curtailment of production shall be. At a meeting of leading cotton mill men two weeks ago, it was agreed that no goods be sold up to the present date for less than a reduction of 8% cents per pound from what print cloths were selling at four months ago. The manufacturers contend that it is of the utmost importance that they should take united action to relieve the depression which has existed in cotton goods for the past three months.

States—were represented here this morning when the annual convention of the United States League of Local Building and Loan associations was called to order by the national president, James Clarence of Philadelphia. It is one of the largest conventions in the history of the league. The delegates, representing nearly every state of the union, were cordially welcomed, and President Clarence combined a response to the greetings with his annual address. The features of the session, however, were the annual address and report of Herman F. Cellarius, of Cincinnati, the general secretary, who was listened to with profound attention. The report contained figures which showed that, while the number of local associations and total membership is not so large as it was a decade or so ago when the building and loan business reached its zenith, the business as a whole is in sounder condition than ever before, many of the weak and irresponsible organizations having been weeded out. Pennsylvania continues to lead in the number of associations, with Ohio, Illinois, Indiana and New York following in the order named.

Friends' Bible Institute. Richmond, Ind., July 26.—Nearly 1000 students are enrolled for the sessions of the Friends' Bible Institute, which begins at Earlham college today and will continue for one week. This year's institute is held under the auspices of three yearly meetings of the society—the Indiana, the Wilmington and Western. The instructors include Thomas Newlin, dean of Guilford college; Professor Graham Taylor, of the Chicago Theological seminary; President Albert J. Brown of Wilmington college and President Robert L. Kelly of Earlham college.

The convention opened today and will continue in session through Thursday. Prominent among the participants are Attorney General Longley of Nova Scotia; Dr. Inch, superintendent of education of New Brunswick; Miss Agnes Deans Cameron of Victoria, B. C.; W. S. Ellis, principal collegiate institute, Kingston; Dr. Coleman, of the Toronto school of science, and James A. Calder, deputy commissioner of education for Northwest territories.
