

FATHER SHOULD SETTLE

Young Canadian Lawyer Sues Parent of Girl Who Jilted Him

Montreal, Que., July 28.—One of the most peculiar breach of promise cases on record is that of a young Italian lawyer, of this city, who is suing the father of the girl who jilted him, a resident of Vickburg, Miss., to recover damages for the time he lost in court and the money he was out in presents. The lawyer figures it out that he courted the young woman 465 hours, at different times, of course, and that the time thus put in was worth \$2 an hour. Besides this, books, dinners, flowers, candy, music, pictures, traveling expenses, engagement ring and so forth, run the account up to \$323.49, which sum he asks the court to allow him.

FOUGHT LABOR UNIONS

Candidate Davis Receives a Severe Roast From an Eastern Paper

Indianapolis, Ind., July 28.—Labor's war on Henry G. Davis, Democratic nominee for vice-president, goes merrily on in Indiana. Edwin Gold, the editor of the state labor organ, made the following statement:

It has been said that the Democrats always can be depended upon to do the wrong thing at a critical time. In nominating Henry G. Davis they sustained their reputation in this line. I notice that some of the newspaper biographies of Davis say that he was at one time superintendent of a plantation. They do not mention that he was the most cruel slave-driver that could be found anywhere. When the war ended he became an exponent of industrial slavery, and as such he has achieved a notorious reputation.

Once Davis made a personal investigation of his mines and discharged every union man he could find and every workman who had made application for membership in the union. Furthermore he ejected the union men and their families from the company's houses. Then he went to the merchants in the town of Elkins and warned them if they extended credit to the discharged miners their own credit would be cut off at the bank, of which he was the president. He is not only a bully of workmen, but a bully of employers in the same line of business.

How in the world any Indiana laboring man can vote for Henry G. Davis is more than I can understand, since he is the cause of the injunction issued by Judge Jackson under which Mr. Blakely, of the Indiana federation of labor, a well-known and highly-respected labor leader, was kept in prison at Parkersville, W. Va., for 21 days.

Labor Paper for Roosevelt.
Omaha, Neb., July 28.—Frank A. Kennedy, editor of the Western Laborer and general organizer of the American Federation of Labor, has sent his resignation to President Gompers. He explains that he intends to make a campaign for Roosevelt, and desires to be free to do effective work.

In a sensational editorial, Editor Kennedy exhorts labor union leaders to enter politics and abandon Bryan and support Roosevelt.
