

LEADING CITIZEN PASSES

A. H. Schaefer Dies at Home in Salem This Morning

Was Manager of the Abstract Company, and a Good Citizen

Arthur H. Schaefer died at the family home in Salem on Thursday morning at 6 o'clock, July 28, 1904, of bowel trouble, aged 57 years.

Deceased had been in reasonable good health for many years, and recently went with his family to Nye Creek for a summer's outing. On Wednesday of last week he was up the coast with a party on a picnic when he was taken with severe pains in the bowels, and from this attack he never recovered. Everything possible was done for him by the local physicians and later the family physician, Dr. Davis, of Salem, was summoned. He kept growing constantly worse, and on Tuesday evening of this week he insisted upon being brought home, as he seemed to feel that the end was not far away. He arrived here last evening, and after a consultation of physicians it was decided to operate upon him, but none of the physicians had any great hope of his recovery. He was removed to the hospital, and after the operation was undertaken it was soon found that the case was hopeless. Everything possible was done to minister to his comfort, but he passed away at 6 o'clock this morning.

Deceased was born in Rohrbach, Baden, Germany, November 11, 1847. He came to America in 1865 and soon thereafter made his home in Nebraska, where he was married in 1879 to Florence J. Ferguson, who survives him. In 1894 the family moved to Salem, where they have made their home ever since, he acting in the capacity of manager of the Union Title Abstract Co. up to the time of his death. Besides the faithful wife, Mr. Schaefer leaves one son, Glen A. Schaefer, who resides in Salem. Mr. Schaefer was a quiet, unobtrusive man, and by his pleasant manner and happy disposition made many friends wherever he was. He was not a member of any church or lodge, yet withal a strong believer in Christian principles. Being a man of an unusually strong spiritual nature, he received great enjoyment from the quiet study of the great problem of life. He was a man of exemplary habits, and an ideal citizen in every respect, one whom the community can ill-afford to lose.

At one time Mr. Schaefer held prominent places in Nebraska political life, and conducted an extensive abstracting and loaning business. After coming to Salem he preferred a more quiet occupation, and was exceptionally happy in his business and

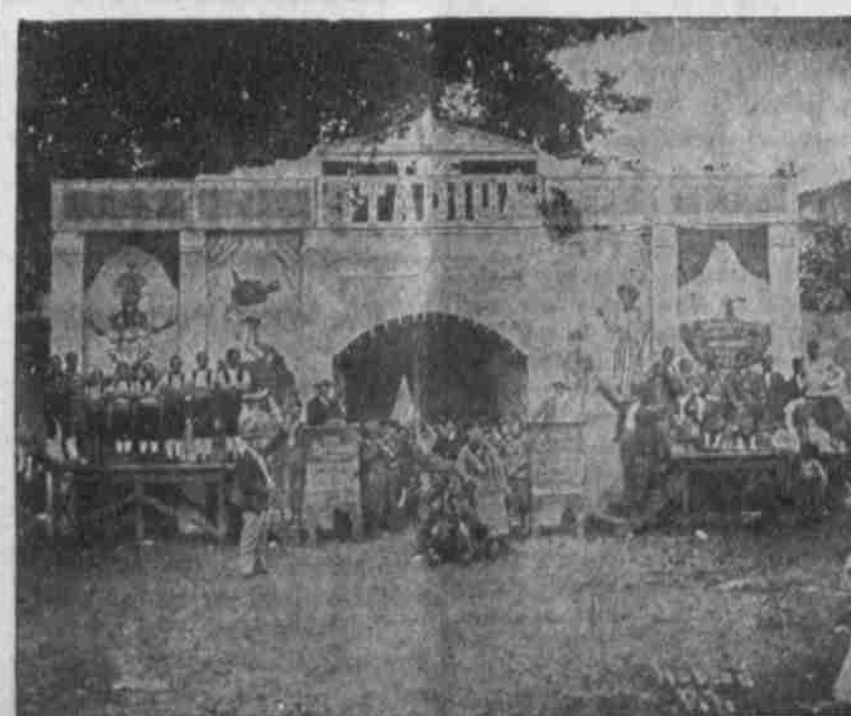
Mrs. Paul Marnach left this morning for Francis, Washington, where she will spend two weeks with her parents.
