In spite of the entire absence of proper food, the soldiers proved their amazing endurance by constructing heavy earthworks on their line of retreat."

STOPPED LOOP SHOW

Coney Island Police Thought Act Too Dangerous

Undoubtedly the most sensational act ever produced in the open air is the famous loop the loop to be seen twice daily during the coming carnival. This attraction is controlled exclusively by the Nat Reiss Southern Carnival company, and Diavolo, the daring young Italian who executes the perilous feat risks his life at each and every performance. The loop the loop is the crowning feature of the stadium and coming at the end of each afternoon and evening performance caps the climax of the Southern Carnival company's enterprises. Diavolo and his understudy, Mons. Magri are at present the only men who loop the loop in America, as the big show at Coney Island has been stopped owing to the recent accident to Chas. L. Peters, and several others. The following taken from the New York Journal, is self explanatory of the cause of the act being stopped throughout the state of New York.

"The accident in which Chas. L. Peters, cyclist, was injured probably fatally while attempting to loop the loop on a bicycle at Luna park, Coney Island, Saturday night, has awakened the police department to the dangerous character of the exhibition. Commissioner Greene after making a personal investigation of the affair yesterday ordered that no more exhibitions be given. There is a law to cover such cases and I intend to see that it is enforced. We would not allow a man to dive from the Brooklyn bridge at the risk of his life to afford amusement to morbid spectators, and I can see no reason why this performance should be allowed to continue. Wm. H. Gorham, while doing a similar turn was seriously injured less than two weeks ago. Besides one man being killed a little over three weeks ago. Those who have not seen this performance cannot realize the risk of life the cyclist runs as he flashes meteor like down the long chute leading to the loop and then like a fly clinging to a ceiling is swept round within the barrel like circle making a final plunge from his machine onto terra firma. Many nervous women have fainted as they saw the daring rider enter the loop. Peters was an understudy to the famous Diavolo, who has himself been injured time and time again. An attaché of the park announced that no performance would be given in the future and the crowds that daily wend their way to Luna park especially to see this famous attraction were visibly disappointed. The cause of the accident was that of too great vibration of the loop, causing Peters to wobble on his wheel. He has a fighting chance for his life and recovery but in the future this performance will have to be given outside of New York state."

Manager Nat Reiss immediately secured a contract with Diavolo and his understudy, for a feature act with the great Nat Reiss Southern Carnival company for the season of 1904, at a cost of \$1000 per week, and this act will be seen here during the coming carnival, twice daily.
