Hong Kong Parcel Post.

Washington, July 28.—Acting Postmaster-General Wynne has signed an order, effective August 1, 1904, wherein the postal administration of Hong Kong has concurred, limiting the val-

ue of parcels post packages exchanged to \$50 each.

Parcels post packages are to be admitted to the mails of Shanghai, Canton, Amoy, Swatow, Foo Chow, Hankow, Hail How, Ningpo, Liukingtau and Chefoo at the same rate and conditions applicable to Hong Kong.

Washington Cons Fight.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 28.—The story of a fight between two convicts at the state penitentiary seems to be confirmed, but the officers at the prison refuse to talk. Bad blood between the two men resulted in an assault by one with a large knife used in making bags. Both were seriously cut. Efforts officially to confirm the story have failed.

Germany Furnishes Munitions.

London, July 28.—The Times this morning says that six German steamers have been chartered to take \$1,500,000 worth of war material from Hamburg to Constantinople. The inference is drawn, according to the Times, that this material is intended for the equipment of the Russian volunteer steamers or other Russian warships in the Black Sea.

Burckhardt Resigns.

Portland, July 28.—On Monday, August 1st, Charles A. Burckhardt, now assistant postmaster, will step down and out, and J. J. Shipley, now in the internal revenue office will assume the place.

LEBANON CUTTING SCRAPE

Lebanon, July 28.—Wednesday night about 11 o'clock Fred Wykoff and Luther Heyne became engaged in an altercation at the lunch room, which ended in a fight, in which Wykoff used a knife on Heyne, making one small cut on his back and a bad gash on his arm. Soon after the fight Wykoff left town for his home near Sodaville.

Last evening Wykoff was arrested and brought into Lebanon. He was arraigned in Justice Lovelee's court, and the charge having been changed to simple assault, he pleaded guilty, and was fined 15 and costs. Wykoff expresses regret at the entire affair.

The two men came from Oklahoma a short time ago, and for a number of years lived in that territory. It is not thought that Heyne will suffer any serious consequences as the result of the injuries inflicted by his opponent.

Armies Appear Idle.

London, July 28.—Practically nothing but the official dispatches relating to the operations in the Far East has reached the London newspapers. With two Japanese armies converging on Haicheng it is not expected that General Kuropatkin will long hold that position.

The Daily Mail's New Chwang correspondent says that the Japanese captured a number of guns during the battle at Ta Tche Kiao, but this statement is not confirmed from any other source.

Squadron is Sighted.

Tokio, July 28.—The Vladivostok squadron was reported off the Province Awa at an early hour this morning.

(Awa is about 200 miles southwest of Yokohama, and is at the eastern entrance to the Inland Sea.)

New York, July 28.—The Herald yesterday published the result of an attempted poll of members of the New York stock exchange, which completely upsets assertions repeatedly made since the St. Louis convention, that the financial and business interests will turn from Roosevelt to Parker. The Herald wrote to each of the 1100 members of the stock exchange, asking for an expression of preference, as between Roosevelt and Parker. Owing to the absence of many from the city only 416 replies have been received, but out of that number 307 declare their intention of voting for Roosevelt and only 103 are for Parker.
