

STRIKERS CLASH AT CHICAGO

Negroes Refuse to Work For Packers and Small Riots Result

Chicago, July 30.—A small riot occurred at the Halstead and 45th street entrance to the stock yards at noon as the result of 25 strike-breakers from Armour's. The strikers set upon them, but the police dispersed them. Several strike-breakers were taken to the police station, where they explained that the negroes from the yards refused to work for the packers, having been brought in under false pretenses. None of the rioters were seriously injured. Altogether there have been seven riot calls today, none of which have terminated in any fatality.

Chicago, July 29.—Through the arrest of George F. Golden, president of the packing teamsters' union, this morning, on the open charge of intimidation by Police Inspector Hunt, the claim is made by the union that an attempt is being made thus to break the strike. Golden stopped a teamster with a load of meat, which he suspected was bound for the Swift branch, and ordered the man, who was a union driver, to take it back. Hunt was near by, and promptly placed the labor leader under arrest. A bond was refused when it was discovered this morning that the session of the nearest police had adjourned. Golden fought hard and was hustled below into a cell at the stock yards station. Another man, charged with picketing, was also arrested. There were a number of sporadic cases of disturbances this morning, but none were serious. The Drovers' Journal, which is considered authority, claims that the packers this morning are operating on 50 per cent. of their normal capacity.

Chicago, July 29.—Golden was released this afternoon on bonds and on an agreement not to go near his headquarters of the stock yards until his case was heard next week. International President Shea, of the teamsters' union, and 23 other union leaders, who were in conference over the livestock handlers' question, adjourned the meeting, and went to the police station. They had a warm talk with Chief Hunt, who threatened to arrest all if they interfered as Golden is alleged to have done. Esopus, July 29.—Mayor McClellan, of New York, will visit Judge Parker today, coming on the yacht Sapphire. Unless the national committee demands that he make speeches in the storm centers during the campaign, prior to election day, Parker will remain silent at Rosemond. Personally he is adverse to a hippodrome canvass, and under no circumstances could he be induced to make a swing around the circle. The judge counts upon making the issuance of his formal letter of acceptance the most important event of the entire campaign. This letter will be a long and weighty document, touching every issue of the national canvass, and will be made public about 10 days after the notification.

RUSSIA FEARS EXILES

Rome, July 29.—The Russian government has asked the police to watch all Russian exiles, as they suspect a wide international plot to kill Russian officials.

Battle at Port Arthur. London, July 29.—Special dispatches from Shanghai and Yokohama report that a general attack on Port Arthur has begun.

A report that General Kuropatkin is wounded, which is appearing in various quarters, seems to have originated at Tien Tsin, but it is not confirmed from any reliable source.

Using "Dumdum" Bullets. Tokio, July 29.—From reports received by the Japanese War office it seems clearly proven that the Russians are making use of "dumdum" bullets in their campaign in Manchuria.

Korea Escapes Russians. Tokio, July 29.—The Pacific Mail Company's steamer Korea, which it was rumored, had been captured by the Russian Vladivostock squadron, has arrived at her destination safely. The Korea sailed from San Francisco for Yokohama and Hong Kong July 12th, with a general cargo.

Tokio, July 29.—It is believed that the Vladivostock squadron is off Yokohama today. The steamer Korea, which has safely arrived at Yokohama, evidently passed close to the Russian vessels.

Ryan Taken to St. Louis. New York, July 29.—John J. Ryan, the race-track man, who is wanted in St. Louis to answer a charge of grand larceny involving about \$500,000 was taken to St. Louis today.

CONFLICTING REPORTS ARE RECEIVED

One States That Port Arthur Has Fallen, but It Is Unlikely

Shanghai, July 29.—A Wei Hai Wei telegram confirms the Chee Foo dispatches reporting the capture of Port Arthur. Wei Hai Wei has a British wireless telegraph station, which communicates with the British ships. It is possible that the information of the fall of Port Arthur was received there in that manner.

Rome, July 29.—There is a rumor current here this evening that Port Arthur has fallen, but no confirmation is obtainable.

St. Petersburg, July 29.—Port Arthur advices received by a circuitous route state that conditions remain unchanged. The Russians hold the railway for 19 versts from Port Arthur, and the opposing armies are almost within sight of each other. There is no likelihood of an assault on the city at present. Semaphores of the Russian and Japanese outposts at Naugalin confront each other, so close are the forces together.

Vladivostock, July 29.—The German steamer Arabia, chartered by an American company, which was captured by a Russian cruiser off Yokohama arrived here today. While a portion of the cargo is contraband, it is not necessarily to be implied that the ship will be seized. The prize court will pass upon the matter, and probably will release the vessel after sequestering the contraband goods. The prize crew is composed of a lieutenant and 42 men from the cruiser Grombol.

Praise the Men. London, July 29.—The Daily Mail's Niu Chwang correspondent, in a long description of the battle of Ta Tche Klao, which mainly repeats the details already known, says it was not until the Japanese attacked all along their front that the Russians retreated. The Japanese artillery was immeasurably superior, and their shrapnel frightfully destructive. Russian gunners went down by hundreds, but their guns were fought with magnificent bravery.

The Russian officers, the correspondent adds, speak in the highest terms of the bravery of their men.
