MICROBE BACK NUMBER

Woods Hutchinson Hot on Trail of Gopher Tick

Guinea Pig Died, but Doctor Is Still Alive to Wage the War

Dr. Woods Hutchinson, the Portland typhoid fever microbe finder, is now hot in pursuit of the gopher tick, and, as the job is about his size, he will probably succeed in exterminating the pest.

The wood-tick lives upon the body of a gopher, and is said to carry the microbe of a disease known as "spotted fever" into the human body, and as 90 per cent of the "spotted fever" cases prove fatal to the human family there has been a determined effort on the part of medical men to classify the disease, and find an antidote for it. The investigation has been carried on to an advanced stage by the Oregon state board of health, and Dr. Matson, the bacteriologist, has satisfied himself that the disease is actually transmitted to man through the bite of the gopher tick. The investigation first started in Idaho, where the bite of the tick is particularly fatal. The victims were chiefly sheep herders and prospectors. The disease attacked man in much the same manner as spinal meningitis, and an eruption under the skin followed its course. It was for a long time thought to be caused by drinking snow water, but now it is attributed to one of the animal microbes. The fever made an annual visitation to Harney county, and the Baker City country, and usually prevails during July and August. It is not usually fatal here, as it is about Bitter Root valley, Idaho, although in both places the gopher is very plentiful, and his blood is found to be swarming with the microbes. Dr. Woods Hutchinson, secretary of the state board of health, had a guinea pig inoculated with blood from an afflicted man at Hood River, and the little animal died within 48 hours. The doctors are now seeking an anti-toxin that will destroy the effects of the tick bite.

POST MASTER SHORT

Roseburg, July 29.—During the past day or two rumors have been gaining circulation in this city of some irregularities in the Roseburg postoffice. Today these reports gained more definite shape, in the assertion that Postmaster Frater had been charged with being about \$500 short in his accounts. Coupled with this information is the statement that Mr. Frater has made good the shortage. Postal inspector Butler was in town this morning, but would neither confirm nor deny these reports. One rumor stated that Mr. Frater's bondsmen would place someone else in charge of the office, but this, we understand, will not be done at present, pending further investigation and advice from the department at Washington. His promptly making good the shortage is cited as showing that there was intention to defraud on the part of Mr. Frater. Pending further investigation, details are unobtainable.

Judge Cleland Injured.

John B. Cleland, judge of department No. 3, in the Multnomah circuit court, met with an accident at Seaside last Saturday, which will deprive him of the use of his left arm for some time. For the past 10 days Judge Cleland has been spending his vacation with his family at Seaside. They occupy a pretty cottage on a hill some distance from the beach, which is reached by an elevated road. The road was built insecurely at one point, and as Judge Cleland stepped near the edge on his way to the beach it crumbled and threw him to the ground. Being a large, heavy man, weighing 230 pounds, Judge Cleland's impact with the soil was with such force as to severely wrench his shoulder.

After Chinaman's Money.

The heirs of Young Chung, the Hubbard hop Chinaman, who was killed by a train at that place last fall, have petitioned the county court for a division of the estate. G. M. Fry, the administrator, has filed his final account, and there is \$1600 cash on hand. The heirs consist of his mother, wife and son, all living in China.

RESULTS WERE GOOD

The town of Hubbard has been experimenting with crude oil on the streets. A correspondent says: "The city has had a lot of crude oil put on some of the streets as a test to see what effect it would have on the dust, and also to see what it will do this winter. So far this season it has kept the dust down in good shape. The oil is much cheaper than sprinkling the streets with water, and also lasts longer."

Rich Oregon Mine.

W. J. Wimer, of the Deep Gravel Mining Company, at Waldo, came to Grants Pass Tuesday with 190 ounces of gold, the result of a test run of seven days and nine nights, with two-inch nozzle at 180 feet pressure. There have been several clean-ups this season, all of which give splendid returns. The flumes and races were cleaned up, and this test run made with the last water of the season.

The company, which is composed of W. J. Wimer and E. A. Reames, last year installed a Hendy elevator, which has proved a splendid success. It is a tubular elevator, the pipe being 16 inches in diameter, and the gravel is raised 14½ feet.

The gold taken out runs about \$18.50 to \$19 per ounce, bringing the test run to about \$3500.—Grants Pass Courier.
