

YIELD ALMOST NORMAL

Oregon Hop Crop Has Gained During the Last Two Weeks

The hops are growing, and bid fair to make about an average crop, according to the best information from the growers. Some of the yards are short, but the increased acreage will overcome this, and the yield will however pretty close around the 90,000 mark.

Reports from Germany have caused a slight drop in the market, but nothing serious is anticipated. During the early part of the year the dry weather affected the crop, but recent heavy rains have revived the vines, and the yield will be greatly increased over previous expectations.

Contracts are hard to make, the growers being willing to take their chances in the market. A few heavy sales in the yards are reported, but this is very risky for the buyers, as it is not a popular business method.

The local hop men are congregating, and the offices will be open for their usual activity in a short time.

Chautauqua Made Money.

Oregon City, Or., July 30.—When all expenses have been met, the management of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua association will have a balance of about \$1000 as the product of their efforts this season. The total receipts of the 12-days' session were \$4000, and it is estimated that the attendance exceeded 25,000.

Several improvements will be considered by the Chautauqua before the convening of next year's session. Among others, the grand stand will be enlarged. There is a disposition among some of the members of the board of directors to extend the length of the Chautauqua meeting, but this is not deemed feasible at this time, although a summer school may be established at Gladstone next year, its sessions to be held immediately preceding the Chautauqua program.

New York Rural Carriers.

Salaries, horse insurance and a number of other questions of interest to those engaged in the rural mail delivery service are on the agenda for consideration and action.

FRANCE BREAKS RELATIONS

Vatican and Republic Are at Diplomatic Logger Heads

Rome, July 30.—M. Coucel, secretary of the French embassy, has informed the papal secretary of state that he has been instructed to break off all diplomatic relations between France and the Vatican, owing to the recall of the bishops of Dijon and Laval to Rome.

Pope Felt Grieved.

Rome, July 30.—"God's will be done. We did everything in our power to avert it," exclaimed Pope Pius X, when he was informed that France had broken diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

Nuncio Must Leave.

Paris, July 30.—The French government this afternoon notified papal nuncio, Lorenzelli, that his presence in Paris was no longer necessary.

Races at Albany.

Albany, July 30.—The Albany Driving Association will give its second race meet at their track near this city this afternoon, and President Edwin Stone is doing all he can to make his arrangements so that the meet will be a pleasurable event for the people of the city and surrounding country who will attend the meet. A goodly number of fine horses are entered for the races, and, with the best of officials, the events promise to be as good as any given at the state fair or other race meets in the state. Some remarkably fast horses have been brought here for the meet, and remarkably fast time will be made. Among those now here to take part in the races is the veteran trainer, Luke Lindsay, of Spokane, who yesterday came up from the Salem track with LeRoy, with a record of 2:10 1/4, the fastest pacer in the Pacific Northwest. Big Dutch, a fast runner, was also brought up from the Salem track yesterday.

Larry Sullivan the Hero.

Seaside, July 30.—One more drowning might have been added to the list of such seaside fatalities yesterday, had it not been for the prompt action of Lawrence M. Sullivan, the former well-known sailor boarding-house keeper, who plunged into the breakers and saved the life of Mrs. Tingry.

A party of bathers were enjoying surf bathing at a point a short distance south of Lockley Hall. Mrs. Tingry got beyond her depth, and it was observed by persons on the beach that she had lost control of herself, and was in imminent danger of drowning. Mr. Sullivan was among those who witnessed her frantic efforts to keep from going under. He hastened to her rescue, none too soon. In her struggles, resulting from fright, she scratched her rescuer's face quite severely. She was safely dragged to the shore, and soon recovered.

The accident occurred about 1 o'clock, which was the regular bathing hour, and many persons were enjoying a dip in the surf.

Walla Walla, July 30.—Mrs. W. D. Fagdale, wife of a man said to be worth \$25,000 was arrested in the store of W. G. Ollee yesterday morning. Later her husband was arrested and the house searched, resulting in the finding of many lots of goods.
