**Parcels Post to Japan.**

Washington, D. C., Aug. 1.—The parcels post agreement recently signed by Postmaster General Payne, on behalf of the United States, and Minister Takahira, on behalf of Japan, went into effect today. The treaty allows a maximum limit of weight of four pounds six ounces in the mails between the two countries. The rate fixed is 12 cents a pound or fraction thereof.
