Plants so highly charged with essential oil that fragments of their leaves move about on water in a mysterious fashion, owing to capillary action, due to the spreading of the oil on the surface, are described by M. Virgile Brandicourt.

For years past the Swiss peasants have had almost a monopoly in the making of certain toys. Now in the vast woods of Northern New England the factories will turn out in one day more toys than fifty households in the Tyrol could produce in a week.

Among the trees that are most sensitive to the wind are the sherry, the plum, the walnut, the black poplar, the service-tree, the ash, and certain varieties of pine. Other pines, especially the mountain varieties, and also certain firs, are very resistant to wind.

Of all the states in the union Texas has the largest wooded area. Nor does this include the chaparral growth extending throughout the Rio Grande country, but only the vast timber section of East Texas and the central and far western woodlands. These are estimated at 64,000 square miles.

An invasion by ants of an office at Exeter, England, was lately resisted by spreading about pieces of paper soaked in peppermint oil. The ants disappeared within half an hour and have not returned.

Esquimo women wear underclothing

made of the skins of birds. These skins before being sewed are chewed well by the women in order to make them soft. About a hundred skins are required to make a shirt.

Owing to great losses of cattle by the rinderpest in Egypt, the large plantations and farmers there are about to introduce steam plows and automobile machines for the cultivation of grain and cotton.

The number of fellow creatures, young and old, who feel impelled to gnaw something is much larger than is generally supposed. The chronic nail-biter is well known, but there are others who either through depraved tastes or psychic disease gnaw wood, fur, cloth, etc., to the great detriment of their health.

The statistics of 94 operations for the bloodless replacement of congenitally dislocated hips performed by Dr. Lorenz and himself are reported by Dr. Ridlon, of Chicago. In but 10 cases does the anatomical replacement seem to be perfect; in 61 cases there are "good results" and 17 were complete failures. The others are still in splints, and, therefore have not yet been radiographed.

The Prince of Montenegro has no use for libel laws to restrain the newspapers, and editors are not punished for contempt of court. This does not arise so much from the liberality of the ruler's principal as from the fact that he is himself the owner and editor of the only newspaper published in his dominions. The paper is called Glas Crnogorca, which is interpreted to mean "The Voice of the Montenegrin."

Experiments conducted by the agricultural department of the university of Missouri have demonstrated that the diseased chinch bugs sent out by the United States department of agriculture to kill the chinch bugs by infection are entirely ineffective. The diseased bugs not only do not transfer their disease to the healthy bugs, but soon after liberation completely recover and do as much damage as the others.
