UNION VETERANS GATHER

National Encampment Will
Soon Be Held in
Boston

Boston, Aug. 5.—The local committee on arrangements expresses confidence that the coming national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic in Boston will be one of the most significant, most interesting and most largely attended reunions ever held by the veterans of the civil war. It has been many years since the veterans were entertained as the guests of this city, but the reception then given the members of the Grand Army was one of the most notable experiences in the history of the order. It is the apparent purpose of the people of Boston and vicinity to make this encampment still more noteworthy. The expert testimony of passenger agents whose roads reach Boston directly or indirectly is that the crowd will surpass any seen here since the great Knights Templar convocation in 1895.

Boston is especially attractive to most of the members of the Grand Army on account of its historic associations and the prominent part it took in the events leading up to the conflict between the states. There is no city in the country in which the G. A. R. and similar organizations flourish more than they do in Boston. The various Grand Army posts of the city and of the entire state, in fact, together with the local organizations of the W. R. C., Ladies of the G. A. R., and Sons of Veterans have entered enthusiastically into the work of preparing for the reception and entertainment of the visitors to the coming encampment. If the welfare and comfort of every stranger here on that occasion are not amply provided for it certainly will not be the fault of the local committees.

The whole city will be handsomely dressed for the occasion. Flags, festoons, streamers and banners will decorate in profusion public and private buildings, business blocks and residences. The arrangements for the decoration of Mechanics' hall have been completed. The bare walls and somewhat scanty usual adornment of the big edifice will be hidden from sight and beautified by an array of bunting, emblems and decorations happily chosen and displayed to produce a brilliant and artistic effect. tion Secretary Morton has given his word that at least eight ships of the navy shall be in Boston waters during the week of the reunion. These will include the training ship Hartford, Farragut's old flagship, and the second torpedo flotilla, composed of the torpedo boat destroyers Whipple, Hopkins, Worden, Lawrence, Stewart, Truxton and McDonough. Arrangements will be made for those who so desire to go on board the warships and see at close range something of the sea fighting power of the United States.

The sessions of the reunion will last for three days, beginning on Tuesday, the 16th. The entertainment of the veterans and their friends however will cover the entire week. Probably the most interesting feature of the program will be carried out on Thursday when the veterans will be taken on an automobile ride to the places of historic interest about Boston. Leaving the city early in the afternoon they will go out through Cambridge, Arlington, Lexington and Concord, the territory made famous by the patriots of the revolution, and along the British line of retreat which followed those early victories of the American arms. The termination of the route will be at Concord, returning by way of Sudbury and Newton.

The same evening there will be given the parade of illuminated floats, which promises to be one of the most brilliant features ever arranged for the entertainment of the Grand Army veterans. The parade will pass over the surface railroads of the city and will consist of 16 tableau cars. There are to be nearly 10,000 electric lights in the make-up of the floats. The keynote of the entire display will be patriotism. The first tableau will be the "Birth of the Flag," in which the Goddess of Liberty appears. The second float will represent the purchase of Louisiana in 1803. Other floats will be "Ocean Conquered in the Year 1819," "The Land of Flowers," depicting the state of Florida, "Triumph of Statesmanship," "Triumph of Electricity," "Lone Star," "Eldorado," "The Triumph of Diplomacy," "The Reunion," "The Midnight Sun," "Triumph of Engineering," "Triumph of Finance," "The Pearl of the Pacific," and the final float "Our New Possessions."

Another novel feature of the entertainment program will be fish dinner to be given on Friday of reunion week. The dinner will be served at Bass Point, and on the trip the visitors will have an opportunity of seeing Nahant and neighboring places.

During the week Boston's historic buildings, including the Old North Church, Faneuil Hall, King's Chapel and the Bunker Hill monument will be open to the general public.

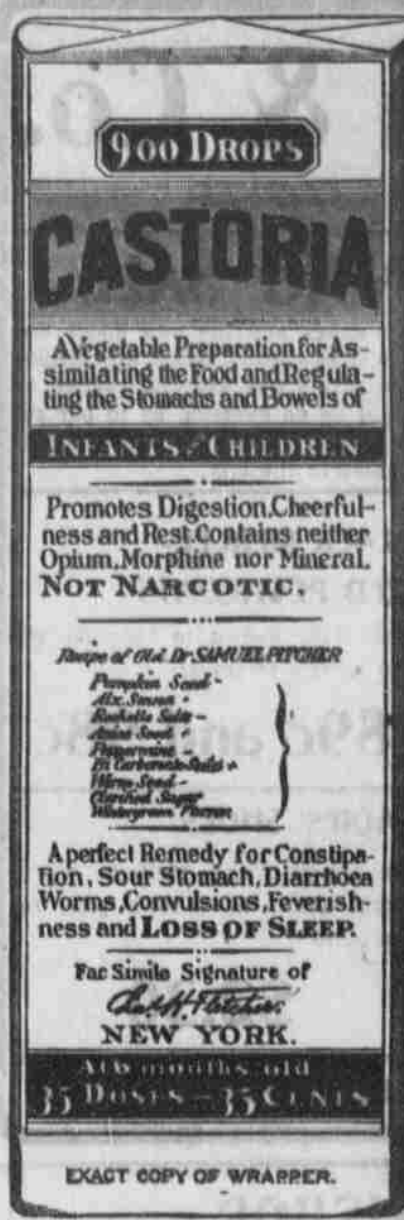
