PROHIS ATTACK BISHOP

Sensational Letter Addressed to the Divine Condemning His Saloon

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 6.—The Kansas City branch of the American Temperance Union strongly disapproves of the ideas of Bishop Potter, of New York, with regard to uplifting the moral tone of the saloon. At a meeting of the union the matter was discussed and a letter was addressed to the bishop, which was sent to him. A copy of the letter follows:

"May God have mercy upon your benighted idea of striking 'the keynote of attack upon the liquor situation.' You are, rather, indorsing the key that opens wide the doors to hell for the army of 100,000 souls who annually leave the king's highway and stumble into drunkards' graves. The present situation across the water of 55 bishops in the Church of England, as stockholders in breweries and distilleries, with this shameful farce of a bishop in the great Episcopal church in our own land taking a leading part in the opening exercises of a saloon, closing the same by singing the doxology, should make every professed Christian follower in this great Episcopal church hang his head in very shame."

Pigmies From African Jungle.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 6.—One of the most remarkable trips in connection with the exploitation of the world's fair was completed when the Rev. S. P. Verner, the Presbyterian missionary, who brought eight pigmies out of the African jungles, arrived at St. Louis. His journey included 26,000 miles, 800 of which were traveled on foot through the wilds and deserts of Central Africa. The trip lasted eight months.

Mr. Verner was reported killed several times and contracted a tropical fever from the effects of which he has been ill in New Orleans for several weeks.

Dr. W. J. McGee, chief of the anthropological department of the world's fair, who talked with Mr. Verner immediately after his arrival here, declared that the minister's trip had been of inestimable value to science.

GATES WERE AJAR

Santa Fe Flyer in Kansas City Hits Trolley Car

Kansas City, Aug. 6.—The Santa Fe passenger train from Los Angeles to Chicago struck the 15th street trolley car at a crossing grade today. J. O. Morris was killed and eight injured. The gates were not lowered through some cause.

Identity is Unknown.

Hood River, Ore., Aug. 6.—Another version of the drowning of a boy last week in a mountain lake in Klamath county comes from Prineville. This time the accident is located at Crescent lake, which is near Odell lake.

The boy's name is given as Frank Oxford, an 18-year-old Eugene lad. This relieves but slightly the uneasiness of Hood River people, who fear the drowned boy was the son of Attorney A. A. Jayne. Mr. Jayne and his sons are long overdue from their outing trip to Odell lake. Mrs. Jayne is absent in Portland, and it seems impossible to get hold of any information that will shed light on the mystery. The first report said it was a Jayne boy who was drowned, and it is thought Mr. Jayne is delayed in an effort to recover the body of his son. The report from Prineville says that efforts to recover the body of the drowned boy have been unsuccessful.

HENRY LOVED MARY

The plan was to have one party go to the front of the jail to attract the attention of the sheriff and his deputies, while another forced an entrance into the rear of the jail.

Russia Getting Liberal.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 6.—As evidence of the increasing leniency for the Jews, the exclusion of Jews from the Jews from the ranks of barristers, followed since 1889, is becoming less rigorous, and it is believed that a complete removal of the disabilities will come later. The bar association asked a return to the old order of things.

New York, Aug. 6.—The National City bank today announced the engagement of \$2,500,000 in gold for shipment next Tuesday to London.

Frauds in Titles.

Chicago, Aug. 6.—St. Louis lines have just discovered that conductors on various railroads and certain scalpers of Chicago and St. Louis have engaged in a conspiracy to defraud the railroads through the manipulation of the exposition tickets. It is declared that instead of taking up return coupons, conductors have been selling them to scalpers. In many instances when tickets to St. Louis and return were presented, conductors are said to have taken up the whole ticket, giving the passenger a return coupon that already had been used. It is estimated that in this manner Chicago-St. Louis roads have been defrauded out of \$200,000.

Albany, Ore., Aug. 6.—The Linn county court yesterday appropriated \$2500 to commence work on a road from Brownsville to the Blue River mines. The work will be under the supervision of A. J. McClure and construction will begin immediately.
