

POOR POKER PLAYER

Lost Three Hundred Bucks
and Sues the Win-
ners

An unusual complaint was filed in department No. 1, today, title of the case is Alfred Farrow, vs. Joseph Johnson and August Camel. The plaintiff in the case is endeavoring to recover \$700 and costs, or double the amount which he claims to have lost at a game of poker played with Johnson and Camel at Gervais during the month of July. The complaint alleges that Johnson and Camel conduct the Log Cabin saloon in Gervais. That they permit the game of poker to be played for money and participate in the profits of the same. That they dealt and played cards and permitted others to do so in their places, contrary to law. Farrow claims to have lost \$350 in this way and now seeks to recover double the amount with costs.

This is the first case of the kind in Marion county courts in a long time and the outcome will be watched with interest. Mr. Bingham is attorney for the plaintiff.

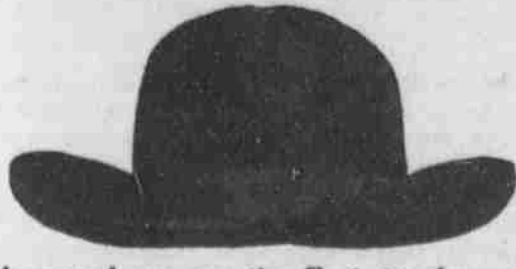

Must Give Bonds.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 6.—The post office department has issued an order directing that all railway postal clerks shall give a \$1000 bond to the United States, "for the faithful discharge of all duties and trusts imposed upon them by law and the rules and regulations of the department. Each clerk shall pay the premium chargeable to himself. Bonds will be filed with the second assistant postmaster general.

This order affects approximately 10,000 employees, embracing all the railway postal clerks except those who are assigned to clerical duty and who do not have access to registered mail.
